



BEOG Applications For 1975-76 Are Available At Clinch Valley College

Students entering college for the first time and those who have not attended a post-secondary institution prior to July 1, 1975 and need money for educational expenses may now apply for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants for 1975-76.

More than \$650 million is

available from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) under this program. During the 1975-76 academic session, grants will be limited to full-time freshmen, sophomores and juniors. You are not eligible if you have attended a post-secondary educational institution at any

time before July 1, 1973.

BEOG applications for 1975-76 are now available in the Student Financial Aid Office. If you feel you may be eligible for a grant under this program, please obtain the application immediately, complete it and submit it soon. It is urgent for you to do this now.

Dr. Vandersee To Speak At First Lecture

Dr. Charles Vandersee, Associate Professor of English and Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Virginia, will present the next Eisenberg Lecture at Clinch Valley College.

Dr. Vandersee joined the faculty at the University of Virginia in 1964. In 1968-69 he worked at the University of Leeds (Yorkshire) where he was a Bruern Fellow in American Literature. He received the B.A. degree from Valparaiso University and both the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of California at Los Angeles, where he was both a Woodrow Wilson Fellow and a Danforth

Graduate Fellow. He also received an ACLS Fellowship in 1972-73.

Dr. Vandersee has published several articles on or related to Henry Adams, and is associate editor of a new edition of the letters of Henry Adams, to be published soon in several volumes by Harvard University Press. He also has edited John Hay, The Bread-Winners, and has written articles on Hemingway, James, modern poetry, and Ernest Poole.

He will lecture on "Divided America: Literature Against the Bicentennial" at 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, February 11, in the Administration Lecture Hall at Clinch Valley College. The public is welcome to attend.

The CVC Film Committee must have chosen the films for this semester in a fit of sentimentality. If Butterflies Are Free and Brian's Song are as popular as they seem to be, it wouldn't be surprising to hear of a Rod McKuen concert at the College in a few years, if that gentleman should ever lower his prices. Yet there is some sense in all this sensibility, if one can catch it amidst the butterflies. Goldie Hawn was charming, and Edward Albert had sensitivity and dignity, in last Sunday's Butterflies Are Free. A fanciful film, but it made a lively effort to say unmaudlin things.

The Seventh Seal on March 2 will escalate your sensibilities. It is Ingmar Bergman's most memorable work, an entrancing allegory on man's search for meaning in life. Max von Sydow is Antonius Block, a disillusioned knight returning from Crusade, to discover the plague wiping out the population, religion becoming fanatical, and society collapsing.

sing. Death appears before him, but he asks for some time, and proposes a game of chess. The knight takes under his protection his bombastic squire, a deaf and dumb girl, and a family of travelling players. Death takes his toll one by one, but Block stalls Death long enough for the young family of actors to get to safety. (Why actors?). Then Death leads his victims away in a dance macabre. Bergman's camera images of life hit you right in the eye, in a film that is mystical, realistic, and poetic. Don't miss it.

Tell Them Willie Boy Is Here is robust American film fare, with sex, violence, and moral aggressiveness. A young Paiute Indian's love for a girl leads to an unintentional killing, which sets off a hysterical press and a vast manhunt for the lone Indian. The film aspires to comment on the "condition of America" question, with subtle references to racial persecution. A huge chair made especially for the broad bottom of President Taft is a central bit of symbolism.

Elvira Madigan is another Swedish film triumph. Reviewers have called it the most beautiful movie ever made. It is the story of romantic love doomed for its refusal to be practical. Elvira Madigan, a legendary Swedish character of the nineteenth century, has a sad love affair with an army lieutenant who has deserted wife and family to run away with a girl in the circus. The lovers dream of the time when

men "will be allowed to make more than one life for themselves." A visual and aesthetic delight.

Brian's Song comes recommended as "a different kind of love story; a powerful tale of brotherhood. The story of two men out of whose tender friendship springs sublime optimism for the future of human beings." It won five Emmys and the Mass Media Brotherhood Award from the National Congress of Christians and Jews. Try to avoid, however, simply wallowing and weeping over the outrageous idea that someone young, beautiful, and powerful might die.

The Film Committee aimed, no doubt, in its choice of films to quicken our sensibilities, a worthy ambition for their limited budget. The thanks of a grateful College should go to Special Services for providing additional monies to augment the modest budget available for films this year.

Financial Aid Policies & Guidelines At CVC

On December 5, 1974 the Student Aid Committee of CVC met and revised the financial aid policies and guidelines to be effective for the spring semester 1974-75. The major change dealt with students who complete less than a full-time load (12 semester hours) during a semester due to withdrawals and incompletes. The Financial Aid Office was authorized by the change to review the number of hours a student completes each semester and if less than 12 semester hours adjust assistance accordingly. Other

minor changes were made and following is the revised financial aid policies and guidelines for your information. The primary purpose of the financial aid program at Clinch Valley College should be to make possible a college education for all qualified students with a demonstrated financial need. In addition to the primary purpose, as funds and programs become available, the Director of Financial Aid should strive to attract students of the highest academic ability to Clinch Valley College with financial need as a secondary

consideration in the distribution of available funds. The Student Financial Aid Office is dedicated to the following principles:

1. To provide financial aid to needy and worthy students currently enrolled or seeking admission.
2. To function as a willing source of counseling for students, high-school counselors, faculty and staff, and the community.
3. To promote at every opportunity the purpose and policies of the financial aid program offered at Clinch

Valley College.

4. To project a favorable image of our institution among our students, faculty and communities.

The distribution of financial aid should be based on the following guidelines:

1. In the selection of a financial aid recipient, consideration should be given to the applicant's academic promise and achievement.
2. The amount of aid should be determined on the basis of a demonstrated financial need. The determination of the amount of aid to each student

should be left to the Director of Financial Aid, but the amount should be based on a set formula. Exceptions to this policy should be made only after consultation of the Scholarship Committee and in cases of scholarships designated for academic achievement and other special forms of financial aid.

3. An applicant may be required to furnish the College confidential proof of his financial need.
4. All financial aid awards should be reviewed each semester. The review of financial aid shall include a check of the number of hours a student completed for the past semester. If the number of hours completed was less than full-time load (12 semester hours), the Financial Aid Office may adjust the amount of assistance received accordingly. Any student not making satisfactory progress should have their financial aid terminated. Aid to any student on academic probation may be terminated. (Exceptions may be made at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee and first-year students shall be given special consideration at the end of the first semester.) Termination of aid should be considered for any student under probation for disciplinary reasons by the Dean or Student Body. (-)
5. All applicants for financial aid must apply for admission to Clinch Valley College before applying for financial aid. No award shall be made until the applicant has been accepted for admission to Clinch Valley College.

(-) Final judgment in such a case should rest with the Director of Financial Aid with consultation of the appropriate Student Body Organization (s) and/or the Scholarship Committee.

help benefit their own majors. At the discretion of the departments the B.S. and B.A. degrees might be obtained without the language requirement as it is presently in some fields. Also there are changes in math requirements and a great deal more to this issue, so we refer you to either the Registrar's office or to your advisor. However, be aware that if you go the new route we warn you to know exactly what you are doing, or else you might

The Planning Committee, after months of "soul searching", set forth their proposal in updating the curriculum requirements of students at CVC. After reviewing and observing the curriculums of a number of other schools in Virginia, Mr. Blackburn presented the proposal on behalf of the committee. Mr. Gilbert attacked the committee's actions on the grounds of: 1) lack of understanding between the various instructors
