of Phi Beta Kappa and was a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Edinburgh. He joined the Clinch Valley College faculty in 1969 and is presently Assistant Professor of History.

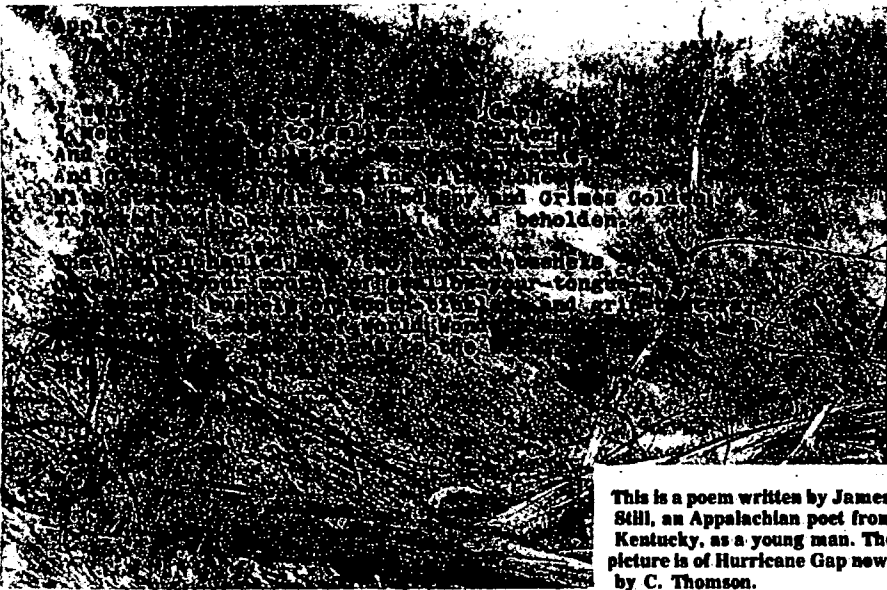

The women's basketball team recently completed a successful, winning season and on their behalf we wish to express appreciation to the many people who contributed in this success. Our primary assistance came from the S.C.A. which gave us financial support of a degree that we had not previously enjoyed. The S.C.A.'s allocation more than tripled our 1972-74 allocation of \$400.00 and enabled us to play a more competitive schedule under guidelines of the Virginia Federation of Intercollegiate Sports for women (VFISW), our governing body.

Our efforts the past two years have been geared toward developing a basketball program which will allow Clinch Valley College to participate in an equal fashion in

VFISW. Contacts have been made and policies challenged which proved discriminatory to small colleges located in the extreme portions of the state. These challenges resulted in the enactment of VFISW policies supportive of small colleges with limited budgets. As a result of the contacts made across the state and the success of this year's team, our schedule next year will include thirteen (13) VFISW sanctioned contests with several colleges traveling to Wise who have never made the trip. The unprecedented financial support of this year's S.C.A. was the big boost we needed to prove that we were in fact a state-wide competitive team.

We are excited about next season for many reasons. Our fan support grows each year and with the advantage of more

home encounters next season with such outstanding teams as V.P.I., Radford College, the University of Louisville, Emory and Henry College, and Sweetbriar College, coupled with this year's success should continue to grow. We hope to continue our contacts with local high school coaches and foster the interest of their teams in the women's sports program at C.V.C. We have been visiting with graduating high school women athletes and informing them of opportunities in competitive sports at C.V.C. Due to the recent revival of women's basketball in area high schools, our program is attracting women with a higher skill level than in previous years. The play of this year's freshmen is indicative of this.

We would like to thank Dr. Davidson for his interest and

support as well as Coach Reaser for his assistance in pre-season drills. Also, a home basketball game could not be successful without the efforts of many people performing a variety of tasks ranging from running the clock to getting the gym in order. Special thanks go to Miri Salyer, Dean Allen, Robert Ledford, Jackie Puckett, Dean Trickett for their dependability and assistance. We would like to thank Richard Meyers for sharing his basketball expertise with us and for his efforts in developing a successful team.

We would like to congratulate the members of the women's team for their cooperation and understanding. They confronted problems, solved them in an adult manner, matured as a group throughout the season, and produced the best win-loss record the team has ever enjoyed. Special recognition goes

to our senior members who have contributed so much in the development and acceptance of women's sports. They possess a unique history in their association with women's basketball and will leave a vacuum which will be difficult to fill.

As we started earlier, our team had to travel all over the state to prove its worth. This year's S.C.A. financial backing and belief in the worth of women's sports coupled with the team's successful season resulted in a state competitive team accepted as an equal in VFISW.

In conclusion, it was an enjoyable experience for both of us. We look forward to participating in the continuing development of this aspect of extra-curricular life at C.V.C.

## The Greatest Coverup Of All

The proposals consisted of first endorsing a letter to the President and Congressional representatives from Virginia supporting the evacuation of orphans from Vietnam. Danny Wood started out with a 6-2, 6-1 victory over Mark Sarver as he still hasn't returned to his old form; Turk

Bond easily handled his man 6-1, 6-2; Gene Garrett had a first set battle but righted himself in the 2nd to win by counts of 11-9, 6-0; Adrian Birmingham handled his man by counts of 6-2, 6-4; newcomer Harry Clary won his first varsity match by winning in straight sets 6-3, 6-3; and Ray Yates was gracious as he allowed a courtesy game at 6-0, 6-1.
