"... Chickens Come Home To Roost..."

The Darden Society of Clinch Valley College will sponsor a lecture by William Hartley on Wednesday, April 30, at 3:30 p.m. in the Clinch Valley College Administration Building. The topic of Mr. Hartley's lecture will be "America Rediscovers Economics or the Chickens Come Home to Roost."

Mr. Hartley received a BA degree in Economics at the University of Colorado, an MA in History from the University of Wisconsin, and both an MS and Ph. D. in Economics from the latter institution. He has also studied at the Graduate School of Business Administration at the University of California at Berkeley. He has served as Professor of Economics at Carleton College and at Iowa Wesleyan College, where he was Chairman of the Department of Economics and Business. Mr. Hartley serves as Chairman of the Department of Business and Public Administration at Clinch Valley. He is currently working on a management development program for area businesses. The lecture is open to the public.

Outstanding Educators Named At C.V.C.

The educators listed below have been selected as Outstanding Educators of America for 1975. Nominated by officials at Clinch Valley College earlier this year, they were selected for this honor on the basis of their civic and professional achievements. Guidelines for selection include an educator's talents in the classroom, contributions to research, administrative abilities, civic service and professional recognition.

Each year those chosen as outstanding educators are featured in a national awards volume, Outstanding Educators of America, which is published under the auspices of Fuller & Dees, Inc.

These men and women, by their actions, mold the course of history. These educators are perpetually aware of the loyalties which bear in their profession and are diligent in their allegiance to them.

The Outstanding Educators are John Glenn Blackburn, Helen Matthews Lewis, and George Edward Culbertson.

Mr. Blackburn, who came to Clinch Valley in 1969, holds a B.A. degree in philosophy from Wake Forest College and the M.A. in Modern European History and the Ph. D. degree in History from the University of

North Carolina. He recently coordinated the use of the public television series "The Ascent of Man" as a course offered by the College. He has chaired both the Lecture Committee and the Academic Appeals Committee, and has served on both the Planning and Curriculum committees. He served as editor of the Self-Study Steering Committee when the College underwent its institutional study in 1973.

Ms. Lewis attended Tiff College and received her bachelor's degree from Georgia College. Her graduate work includes courses at Duke University, the University of Virginia where she received her M.A. in Sociology, the University of California at Berkeley where she participated in a National Science Foundation Institute in Anthropology, and the University of Kentucky where she received the Ph. D. degree. Ms. Lewis came to Clinch Valley College in 1955 and now directs the College's Social Welfare Program. She was a proponent of the development of an Appalachian studies program in the region and has written extensively on Appalachian studies and on coal mining and its effects on the mountains,

people, and religion. She is a Fellow of the American Anthropological Society, a consultant for Westinghouse on coal mine health and safety, a member of the Southern Sociological Society, and a member of the Task Force in Southern Regional Development of the Southern Regional Council.

Mr. Culbertson holds B.S., M.S., and Ph. D. degrees from Virginia Polytechnic Institute. While at VPI he held an NDEA Graduate Fellowship and participation grant. He came to Clinch Valley College in 1970 from the U.S. Naval Academy where he was an Assistant Professor of Mathematics. He presently is Registrar, Associate Dean of the College, Director of Summer Schools, and is directing the College's continuing education program. Mr. Culbertson has worked to develop the computer activities at the College and to make computer services available to area schools. He directed the institutional Self-Study of the College which was accomplished in 1973. He is active in community affairs, serving on the board of the Industrial Development Authority of the Norton Little League.

Reynolds-Baker Square Off For Presidential Race

This week Jasper E. Reynolds filed petition to challenge incumbent S.C.A. President Roy W. Baker in the Presidential election now set for May 7th. Reynolds, 26, is a Junior this year and a native of Buchanan County. Candidate Reynolds has decided to challenge incumbent Baker as a result of what has been termed "necessity for effective leadership" by Reynolds and his many followers.

Last week incumbent Baker officially announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of student government President. Baker stated, "I feel that all the campaign promises have been fulfilled. Therefore, I would, at this time, like to announce that I will again seek election."

Presidential candidate Reynolds charged that the Baker Administration was extremely ineffective in conducting business affairs, managing the budget and handling student functions. (Remember the weekend to see Red.) Reynolds stated that the student government should be oriented toward all students rather than toward a special interest few who merely want a title for their college record.

It is this writer's opinion that the student body take a long hard look at student government, what it has been, what it presently is, and what it can be. The Student Body President supposedly represents the student body. We all want a man or woman who will lead and take active participation to see that more and better student oriented functions (concerts, movies, dances, special occasion affairs, etc.) be presented to ease the pangs of college life. We all want, also, a person who stands for the students and is adept enough to deal with the proper channels and authorities to produce results instead of excuses. We want and need Jasper!

It is most shocking that Mr. Baker announced that he had fulfilled all his campaign "promises" (that defeated Andy Kersey) and he is ready to offer himself as a service, again, to the student body. Mr. Baker is a service that we no longer need.

This writer endorses Jasper Reynolds for President of the S.C.A. The time is now for change, progressive action in the student government and Jasper Reynolds can provide the office with this desired talent when we need it most. Now is the time for all concerned students to come to their own aid and vote for Reynolds on May 7th.

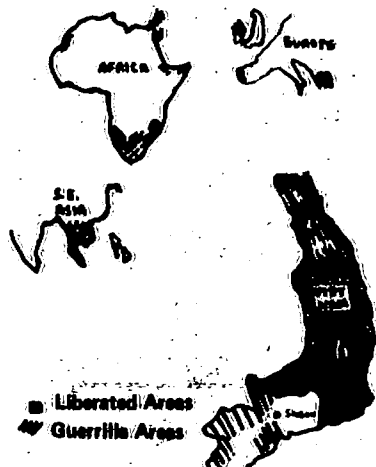

Early Registration Instructions

The two primary components of the pre-registration process for the Fall Semester include:

- Schedule preparation
- Payment of fees.

Those students currently enrolled and planning to return next fall may prepare their fall schedules and submit them to the Registrar's Office according to the following timetable:

- Rising Seniors (At least 84 semester hrs. by end of August 1975 - Thursday, May 1)
- Rising Juniors (From 64 to 83 semester hrs. by end of August 1975 - Monday, May 5)
- All Others - Wednesday, May 7.

The Record of Academic Progress (RAP) forms (2 copies) have been prepared for each student that is expected to return for the fall semester and have been distributed to the student's advisor. The RAP form will serve as an academic advising tool and it is expected to make the advising process more responsive to the needs of the student.

The steps to follow in preparing your Fall Schedule are:

- Make an appointment with your advisor on or before the scheduled day for your class. Check to see that he/she has your RAP form. Lists of students and advisors have been posted on bulletin boards on the campus. If your name is not listed, contact the Registrar's Office for the name of your advisor.
- With the advisor go over your RAP form, the schedule, and the requirements in your planned major. Complete the course study card and the three-part schedule sheet (advisor will have these). Be sure to copy the schedule number correctly as this is the number the computer uses to put you into the class you request.
- Important: Courses to be taken under the Audit or credit-non-credit system must be designated as AU or CR-NC, respectively, these should be approved by your advisor or his representative. If you are repeating a course in which you previously earned an F or a D, you must designate same by (R).
- Seniors planning to student teach; next semester must notify the Chairman of the Education Department (Room 122 Zehner Building) and have him or his representative initial the course study card.
- Submit the following forms to the Registrar's Office:
 - Course Study Card
 - Fall Schedule Sheet

Your schedule is then complete and barring some unforeseen problems, all that remains to be done is the payment of fees.

Additional information regarding registration - payment of fees, registration of motor vehicles, etc., will be published in the newspapers.

Final Program In Concert Series

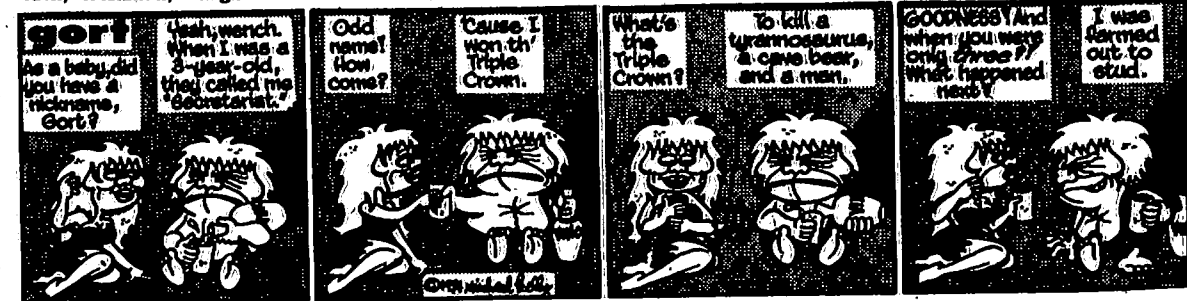
The Gladeville Council of the Performing Arts will present the last program of its current concert series May 1 at 8 p.m. in the J.J. Kelly High School Auditorium.

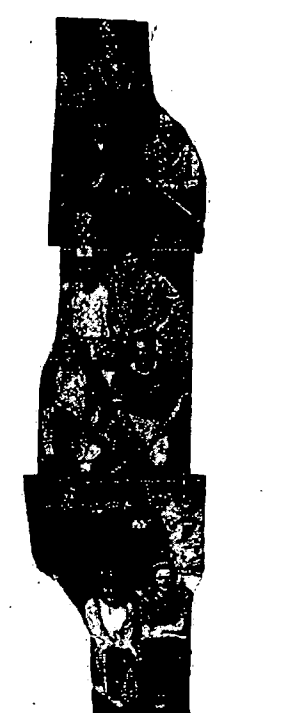

As the men's tennis team took their first weekend trip ever, there was a little excitement and some discouragement. No. 3 Gene Garrett was and so would not accompany the team, but an overnight trip was welcomed by all who went. Led by our coach Van Daniels, CVC missed a shutout by 1 match. No. 2 Turk Bond who is usually consistent, lost 6-1, 6-3 to Larry Mannon but everyone else swept the court with good victories. No. 1 Danny Wood, who is now 30-5 on college play, defeated M. Hatcher 6-3, 6-1; Roy Yates whipped A. Kozar 6-2, 6-1; Harry Clary and No. 4 ran down F. O'Brien 6-3, 6-0; Pat Thompson playing his first singles of the year, beat D. Moore 3-6, 6-2, and Adrian "Tyron" Birmingham whipped M. Buckland 6-1, 6-3. In the doubles Bond and Clary had

a ball as they took turn losing games where they could serve but took an easy 6-2, 6-4 win. Wood and Yates teamed to win at 6-2, 6-4 also. In the most exciting match Adrian Birmingham and Pat Thompson won two close matches at 7-5 and 6-7 as the wind played in their favor.
