Special Notices

Rules, regulations and fee schedules for use of College facilities: Membership fees include tennis courts, swimming pool, and gymnasium (during recreational activities). Effective Sept. 1, 1975.

A. All Clinch Valley College facilities will be available for use in the following priority order.

1. Classes first.
2. Organized athletic events second.

3. Students, faculty, staff, and members.

4. Outside organizations and groups based on a specific fee.

B. All weather bulletin boards will have scheduled events posted on a weekly basis.

C. I.D. or membership cards must be presented each time facilities are used. Student monitors will be available during the peak hours of usage.

D. Those persons eligible to use recreational facilities are:

1. Faculty and staff members including spouse and children.
2. Members who pay fees as follows:
 - a) Regular membership fee - \$25 - sem. + \$25 - summer for single person or husband and wife + \$5 - sem. & summer for each child. Annual fee paid in advance \$60 + \$5 - child each session.

b) Alumni membership fee (Reduced Rate) - \$10 - sem. + \$10 - summer for single person or husband and wife + \$5 - sem. & summer for each child. Annual fee paid in advance \$25 + \$5 - child each semester.

c) Donor's membership fee - all donors who contribute \$100 or more during any fiscal year will receive membership cards for that particular year.

d) Complimentary membership - Advisory Board.

E. Other Rules and Regulations pertaining to student, faculty, staff, and members.

1. Parents must accompany children under 12 yrs. of age while using swimming pool.
2. Guests of eligible members (including students, faculty and staff) must pay \$50 per person for use of pool per day.
3. Guests of eligible members

(including students, faculty and staff) must pay \$2.00 per guest for use of tennis courts. One member can only tie up one court for the specified time limit.

4. There will be a one - hour limit on the use of tennis courts while playing singles when players are waiting.

5. There will be a two - hour limit on the use of tennis courts while playing doubles when players are waiting.

6. Doubles encouraged when players are waiting for court.

F. Fees for outside groups for use of facilities:

1. \$5 - hr. for use of baseball field and two tennis courts.
2. Flat rate of \$50 - day for all six tennis courts.
3. \$25 - hr. for use of gymnasium and swimming pool.
4. \$15 - hr. for large classroom.
5. \$10 - hr. for small classroom.

G. Outside groups are expected to pay within 24 hours after vacating facilities. Each group must pay before using facilities again.

H. All fees will be used to maintain and improve student services.

Use Of Catalog In Registration

A candidate for a degree is normally expected to satisfy the degree requirements of the college catalog that was in effect at the time he - she entered Clinch Valley College. The catalog is the official document for determining the course descriptions, prerequisites, degree requirements, etc. The Schedule and Classroom Directory is intended to be a guide in schedule preparation, and registration; it in no way replaces the official catalog of the college. The student should refer to the college catalog in developing a schedule for the next session.

Declaration Of Major

Those students who plan to graduate from Clinch Valley College and have earned at least 64 semester hours and

have not previously done so should prepare a declaration of major form (available in the Registrar's Office). This form should be prepared in consultation with the student's advisor and the chairman of the department housing the major. The chairman will collect the forms and forward the information to the Registrar.

Application For A Degree

Students expecting to complete degree requirements during the coming year are required to complete a Degree Application and pay a \$10.00 graduation fee. This fee covers the cost of the diploma and the purchase of cap and gown for graduation. Degree Applications will be available and should be picked up from the Registrar's Office in September and October 1975. Degree Applications should be completed and returned to the Registrar's Office by December 1, 1975.

Veterans Affairs

Students expecting to receive Veteran's Benefits but have not yet applied, please see Mrs. Short in the Registrar's Office as soon as possible.

Veteran Representative on Campus: The Veterans Administration will have a VET-REP on the CVC campus one day each month. He will be available for your questions concerning VA benefits, payments, services, etc. As soon as his scheduled visitation dates are available, notification will be sent to all students concerned with veteran's benefits, and the schedule will be published in this paper.

In every person's life there comes those times that are either savored or dreaded. New Offerings In Music At Clinch Valley College

Music offerings this fall at Clinch Valley College will include Music 101 (Ensemble) in which instruction in guitar, banjo, and fiddle will be featured. This class will be offered for one hour of credit on Wednesday nights.

Music 310 (Appalachian Chorale) will include a survey of Southern music to include ballads, gospel music, string bands, bluegrass, Afro-

American, Cajun, native music and musicians will be studied including Dock Boggs, the Carter Family, Ralph Stanley, Roscoe Holcomb, and I.D. Stamps.

Music 325 (Music Education for Elementary Teachers) will continue to be offered for students majoring in elementary education, and Music 328

(General Music Appreciation) also is scheduled. Individual piano and classical guitar instruction are available.

Under the College's continuing education program the music section of the Department of Humanities will offer two courses at night: Sacred Harp Singing (shape note gospel singing) for one hour of credit on Tuesdays from 7:00 to

8:00 p.m., and Folk and Square Dancing from 8:00 to 10:00 on Wednesday nights. For persons interested in learning to call dances, a period will be set aside for instruction in that art prior to the class in dancing, with 1/2 hour credit given.

Music instruction will be provided by John M. McCutcheon and Madeline M. Allen.

Dallas D. Owens will join the Clinch Valley College faculty this fall as Assistant Professor of Sociology.

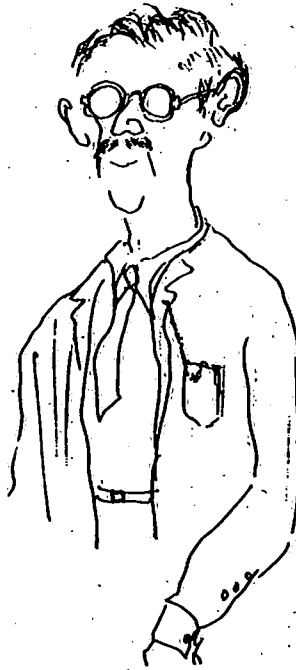
Mr. Owens received the B.A. from the University of North Carolina, his M.S. from Utah State University, and is currently completing work on his Ph.D. degree in Sociology at
