### Five New Members Appointed To CVC Advisory Committee

Dr. Frank L. Hereford, Jr., President of the University of Virginia has appointed five new members to the Clinch Valley Advisory Committee. These new members are as follows: The Honorable Orby Cantrell, Ms. Sarah Elizabeth Fugate, Mrs. Virginia H. Meador, Mr. James A. Muse, and Mr. James C. Roberson.

Mrs. Meador will replace Mrs. Waldo Milles who resigned from the Advisory Committee to accept an assignment as a

member of the State Community College Board. Mr. James A. Muse will replace the late W. D. Richmond of St. Paul Virginia.

The other members who are rotating off the Board are the Chairman, The Honorable Leslie M. Mullins of Norton, Virginia, Mrs. Kent Riggs of Wise, Virginia, and Dr. Everett Stanley of Abingdon, Virginia.

The Honorable Orby Cantrell of Pound; Virginia is a powerful member of the Virginia General

Assembly. He is Chairman of the Committee on Cities and Towns and is a member of the House Appropriations Committee. Delegate Cantrell introduced the bill making Clinch Valley College a four year degree granting institution and took the leadership in getting the bill passed and signed by Governor Mills E. Godwin, Jr. - Ms. Sarah Elizabeth Fugate of Abingdon, Virginia is a former resident of Wise, Virginia. She is the daughter of Mr. C. P. Fugate and the late Ida Fugate. Ms. Fugate has lived for a number of years in Florida and has just recently moved to Abingdon where she is establishing a new business. She is one of the principal stockholders in the C.P. Fugate Company of Wise.

Mrs. Virginia H. Meador is the wife of Mr. Harry W. Meador, Jr., Vice President - Operations, Westmoreland Coal Company. Mrs. Meador is a member of the Virginia State Library Board. She is an active church and civic worker in Big Stone Gap, Virginia.

Mr. James A. Muse is Senior Vice President of the First National Exchange Bank of St. Paul, Virginia. He is the Co-Chairman of the St. Paul Planning Commission and is Past Chairman of the Group V and Director of Virginia Bankers Association.

Mr. James C. Roberson of Wise is an Attorney in Norton, Virginia with the firm of Greear, Bowen, Winston, Mullins and Roberson. He is Chairman of the Wise County School Board and is a civic and church leader in the Wise area.

These new members will join the following on the Clinch Valley College Advisory Committee: Mr. L. Bonsall Sykes; Mr. Earl G. Jackson; Dr. John C. Buchanan; Mr. C. L. Chandler; Mr. William

Kanto; Honorable Ford Quillen; Mr. L. C. Martin, Jr.; Dr. G. D. Vermilya; Mr. William B. Cohen, Dr. Brownie E. Polly; and Mr. Paul W. Skeen.

The Advisory Committee is one of the most important agencies in the founding and development of Clinch Valley College of the University of Virginia. Since the founding of the College, this Committee has supported the growth and development of this university college of the University of Virginia. The College opened on September 13, 1954 with 110 students. Students are still being enrolled at the College for this fall semester, and it now appears that the College will have its greatest year of growth in that the school is expected to register over 1,000 students.

Chancellor J. C. Smiddy in announcing the appointment of the new members on the Advisory Committee calls attention to the many significant contributions made by the people of southwest Virginia to the founding and development of the University of Virginia's only branch college. Chancellor Smiddy stated, "Clinch Valley College of the University of Virginia has been able to improve the quality of its parent institution with that of the initiative of the great people of southwest Virginia in developing an institution of higher education where the quality academic program is being offered to our people at a cost that does not prohibit anyone who wants to attend college to enroll at Clinch Valley College."

CVC Membership Drive For Students And Faculty To Become 'Concerned Citizen For Fair Taxes'

Virginia's current 1/4 of 1 percent severance license tax is less than her neighboring states: Kentucky - 4 percent of gross; West Virginia - equivalent to 3.85 percent of gross; Tennessee - 20 cents per ton or roughly 1 percent of gross.

There are many people in Virginia that feel that the present severance tax in Virginia is not high enough, is loosely defined, and leaves too much to the discretion of local politicians.

This paper proposes an increase in the present tax to at least 3 percent of gross receipts which would mean approximately \$6,000,000 per year for Wise County alone.

Now is the time to press for a new severance tax law. Elections for county seats and the State legislature are nearing and this can become a real issue if the public has its attention drawn to the facts.

The argument that such an increase would destroy the coal industry can be countered by the fact that Westmoreland survives in Montana which has just increased their severance tax to 30 percent.

There will be a meeting of "Concerned Citizens for Fair Taxes" to discuss the severance tax issue on September 30, 1975 at 7:30 p.m. This meeting will be held at the Student Union Building located on Coeburn mountain road (Rt. 648).

Orestia To Be Shown

Murder, ritual sacrifice, and re-entry of spirits into this world are topics of current moviegoing interest. They are also the subject matter of a film to be presented at Clinch Valley College by Roy Ball, September 15. The film, "Orestia", is a screen adaptation of a famous trilogy by one of the greatest Western European playwrights of all time, Aeschylus.

Fifty thousand feet of 35 mm color film was used by Webster Productions in the making of the film and Capital Films in Washington finalized the effort after "weeks of delicate technical work in the laboratory."

Throughout the film, a narrator will relate the story in

English and the audience, as a third party, will sense a feeling of "secretly witnessing" the violence and passion.

The story line leaves nothing to be desired in the way of offering conflict and violence. Agamemnon, King of Greece, killed his daughter as a sacrificial offering and left his wife and home to go to war in Troy, where he found comfort and fond remembrance of his wife in the princess Cassandra.

Orestes, now a fugitive, is pursued by the Furies, a vigilante group whose particular duty is to punish the murder of blood relatives. Orestes is pursued to Athens where he is held for trial in the Supreme Court for the murder of his mother. The court arrives at a verdict and the viewer departs without fear of flood or shark, rather with an insight into parricide.

## Young Democrats To Hear Presidential Candidate Carter

Castlewood -- 1976 Democratic Presidential candidate Jimmy Carter will address a rally of Young Democrats sponsored by the Ninth District Young Democrats in Castlewood, Saturday, September 20th at 4:00 p.m. through 7:00 p.m. Beef will be served at \$10.00 per couple.

Joining Presidential candidate Carter will be former Lt. Governor Henry E. Howell, Jr. Howell is expected to announce for Governor as a Democrat soon. Admrial Elmo Zumwalt will also be addressing the rally. Zumwalt is considering running against incumbent Senator Harry F. Byrd, Jr. in the 76 election. Charlie Horne, Treasurer of the Virginia Democratic Party, and expected choice of Democrats to challenge Wampler in 78, will introduce candidate Carter.

Former Georgia Governor Jimmy Carter is considered a long-shot for the 76 Democratic Presidential nomination. The

biggest question remaining in Carter's campaign is whether or not he can defeat Governor George Wallace in his home state of Georgia. Recent polls are giving Governor Wallace the edge.

Yet, many consider Carter a strong candidate. "He has the image of being the John Kennedy of the South", one Democrat said.

Carter is the second Democratic Presidential candidate to visit the area. Last summer Texas Senator Lloyd Bentsen, a Democratic candidate for President visited Wise. These two candidates have produced battle lines in Virginia for pre-convention politics. Henry Howell and Charlie Horne have endorsed Carter while Attorney General Andrew "Pickens" Miller and State Democratic Party Chairman Joseph T. Fitzpatrick have endorsed Senator Lloyd Bentsen.
