Diehl To Speak On Biology: Science Or Art

The 1976-78 Eisenberg Lecture Series at Clinch Valley College begins on November 6 with a presentation by Dr. Fred A. Diehl of the University of Virginia.

Dr. Diehl, Associate Professor of Biology and Assistant Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at the University, received the B.A. degree in Biology at Bridgewater College, and the Ph.D. at Western Reserve University. He also has spent several summers at Woods Hole marine Biological Laboratories. He was a Postdoctoral Fellow in

the NIH Cancer Institute at the Université Libre de Bruxelles in Brussels, Belgium in 1964-65, and an N.S.F. Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Virginia in 1968.

The topic of Dr. Diehl's lecture is "Biology as Liberal Arts versus Biology as Science, or What College Students Need to Know about Biology (and Never Dared Ask)." It is scheduled for 11:10 a.m. on Thursday, November 6, in the Lecture Hall of the Administration Building on the CVC Campus. The public is cordially invited.

Jefferson's Document Needs Work

(Dedicated to all those who write grant proposals)

Suppose the Founding Fathers assembled in Philadelphia to hammer out a new form of government had been forced to contend with a 1975-style bureaucracy? Chances are that instead of preparing for the July 4 Bicentennial, our biggest national holiday would be the Queen's birthday.

For a glimpse of what might have been, consider the following allegedly worked-up by some fun-loving, but anonymous, type at the Agency for International Development. AID has one of the most talented collections of writers, editors, artists and photographers in government. Also, we got this free from them.

Somboddy at AID, without the intestinal fortitude of John Hancock who signed his name, big, worked up this example of what Thomas Jefferson and company would face today, if they had to run a draft of a "Declaration of Independence" past bureaucrats, technocrats and lawyers for approval. This, the AID people say, is what Jefferson's rejection slip might read like:

"Dear Mr. Jefferson. We have read your "Declaration of Independence" with great interest. Certainly, it represents a considerable undertaking, and many of your statements do merit serious consideration. Unfortunately, the Declaration as a whole fails to meet recently adopted specifications for

proposals to the Crown, so we must return the document to you for further refinement. The questions which follow might assist you in your process of revision.

"1. In your opening paragraph you use the phrase 'the laws of Nature and Nature's God.' What are the criteria on which you base your central arguments? Please document with citations from the recent literature.

"2. In the same paragraph you refer to the 'opinions of mankind.' Whose polling data are you using? Without specific evidence, it seems to us, the 'opinions of mankind' are a matter of opinion.

"3. You hold certain truths to be 'self-evident.' Could you please elaborate. If they are as evident as you claim, then it should not be difficult for you to locate the appropriate supporting statistics.

"4. 'Life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness' seem to be the goals of your proposal. These are not measurable goals. If you were to say that 'among these is the ability to sustain an average life expectancy in six of the 13 colonies of at least 55 years, and to enable all newspapers in the colonies to print news without outside interference, and to raise the average income of the colonists by 10 percent in the next 10 years,' these would be measurable goals. Please clarify.

"5. You state that 'whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the Right of the

People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute a new Government...' Have you weighed this assertion against all the alternatives? Or is it predicated solely on the base instincts?

"6. Your description of the existing situation is quite extensive. Such a long list of grievances should precede the statement of goals, not follow it.

"7. Your strategy for achieving your goal is not developed at all. You state that the colonies 'ought to be Free and Independent States,' and that they are 'Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown.' Who or what must change to achieve this objective? In what way must they change? What resistance must you overcome to achieve the change? What specific steps will you take to overcome this resistance? How long will it take? We have found that a little foresight in these areas helps to prevent careless errors later on.

"8. Who among the list of signatories will be responsible for implementing your strategy? Who conceived it? Who provided theoretical research? Who will constitute the advisory committee? Please submit an organizational chart.

"9. You must include an evaluation design. We have been requiring this since Queen Anne's War.

"10. What impact will your program have? Your failure to include any assessment of this inspires little confidence in the long-range prospects of your undertaking.

"11. Please submit a PERT diagram, an activity chart, and an itemized budget.

"We hope these comments prove useful in revising your "Declaration of Independence."

"Best wishes, Lord North.
P.S. Could you please enclose vitae of the vitae of the signatories? We need them for our files.

"P.P.S. We note that you have not included a logical framework matrix listing underlying assumptions, and end of project conditions. Please submit with your revised paper."

Proposed Amendments To The Constitution Of The Honor System Of Clinch Valley College

Five amendments have been proposed to the Constitution of the Honor System. They will be printed for three consecutive weeks in the Highland Cavalier and then be brought to the student body for a vote Wednesday, November 19. The sections affected have been printed as they stand and following as the proposed amendments would change them.

Article 11 Section 3.
Before any student may become a candidate for a position on the Honor Court, other than those candidates appointed by the Chairman to seek vacated positions, he must sign a declaration of candidacy to be filed with the Dean of Students no later than nine calendar days prior to the election day.

A plurality of the vote is necessary for election. (In the event that not enough students file declaration of candidacy two candidates for each vacancy will be appointed by the Chairman of the existing Court, with the agreement of the plurality of that court, to run in the general election. A permanent Chairman shall be chosen from those members elected in April. The Chairman shall be elected by a plurality vote of those members.)

Amendment 1 - To delete last three sentences in paragraph two of Section 3, Article 11 and insert - For every number of vacancies per class, there shall be at least (N-1) candidates. If not enough candidates file declarations of candidacy then the Chairman of the existing Court, with the agreement of the plurality of that court, shall appoint sufficient candidates to fulfill the (n-1) requirement to run in the general election. A permanent Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall be chosen from those members elected in April. Both shall be elected by a plurality vote of those members.

Article 11 Section 6.
When a vacancy occurs on the Court, other than the Chairman, the Chairman shall make it known to the student body that an election will be held on the third Wednesday after the vacancy has occurred. Any student who wishes to seek the vacated office must file a declaration of candidacy with the Dean of Students nine days before the election day. (If a vacancy occurs in the chair, a temporary chairman will preside until such time as a permanent chairman shall be elected by a plurality vote of the Court.)

Amendment 11 - To delete the third sentence of Section 6, Article 11 and insert - If a vacancy occurs in the chair, the Vice-Chairman will preside until such time as a permanent chairman shall be elected by a plurality vote of the Court.

Article 111 Section 3.
The prosecutor of the Honor Court shall act as counsel for the student body in cases involving alleged violations of the Honor System. The prosecutor shall have the power to select special assistants from the student body with the approval of the Honor Court to aid in a confidential investigation of alleged violations. He shall have the power to subpoena articles of evidence he feels to be pertinent to the case. He shall have the power to subpoena any member of the student body and request the testimony of others.

Amendment 111 - To add following paragraph to existing section of Section 3, Article 111 - If the prosecutor believes a member of the Honor Court to be biased he must present a statement to the Court giving the reasons why he believes the member to be biased. Allegations of partiality against more members than one are to be considered individually, separate and apart, from one another. A member may be declared biased by the majority of the unquestioned members. If a member is found to be biased, the Chairman shall remove him from the case.

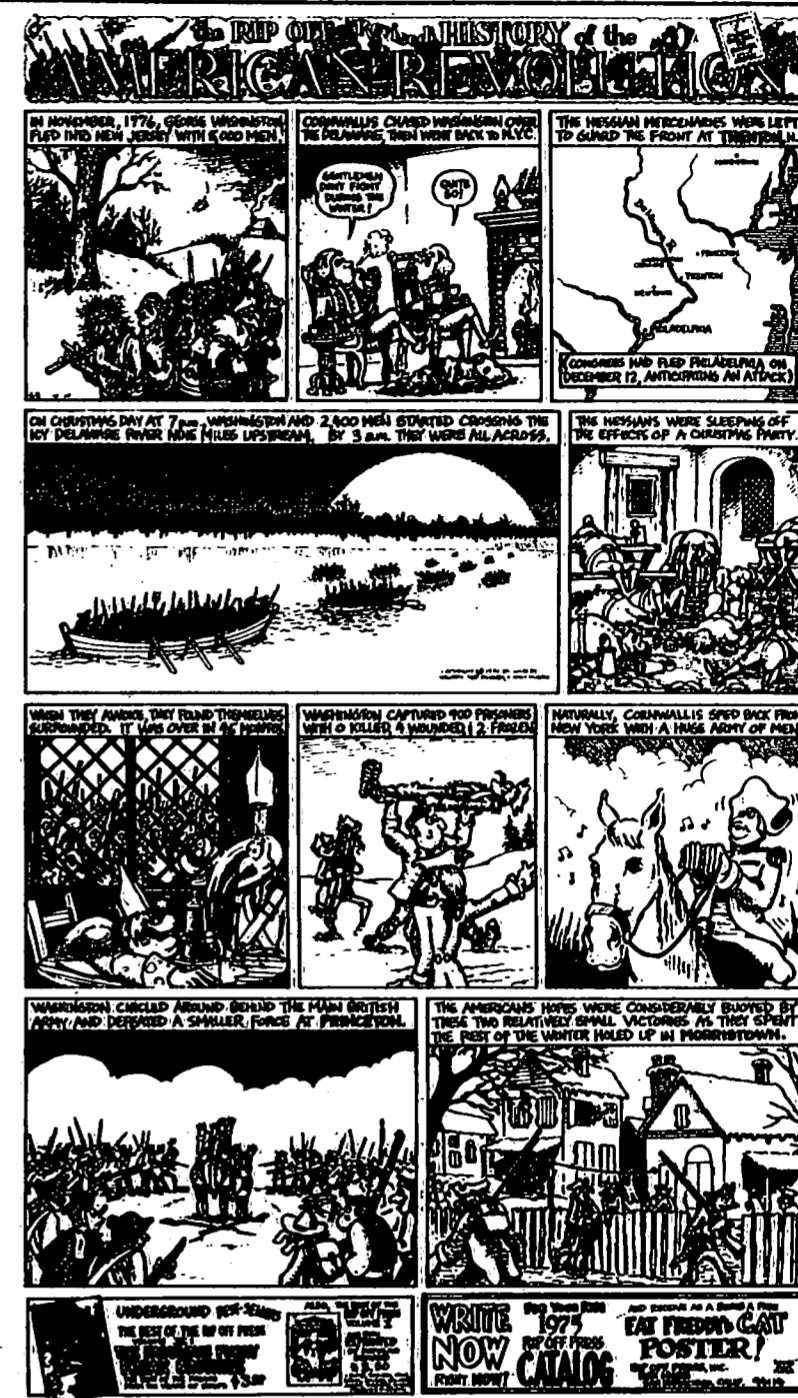
Article VI
The Honor Court may, with a 2/3 majority of the unquestioned members, vote to remove any member for neglect of duties or for conduct unbecoming an Honor Court member. Only one member at a time can be brought into question.

Amendment IV - To insert the phrase - exclusive of vacancies - in the first sentence of Article VI to read as follows:

Article VI
The Honor Court may, with a 2/3 majority of the unquestioned members, exclusive of vacancies, vote to remove any member for neglect of duties or for conduct unbecoming an Honor Court member. Only one member at a time can be brought into question.

Article VII
Amendments to this constitution may be proposed by any student of Clinch Valley College. The Honor Court must approve any new amendments by a majority vote. Upon the approval of the Court, the amendments will be posted in the College newspaper for three consecutive weeks. On the first Wednesday after the final publication of the proposed amendment, the student body shall vote on the amendment by secret ballot. The amendment shall be adopted if ratified by a 60 per cent majority vote.

Amendment V - To delete the fifth sentence of Article VII and insert
The amendment shall be adopted if verified by a 60 percent of those voting.

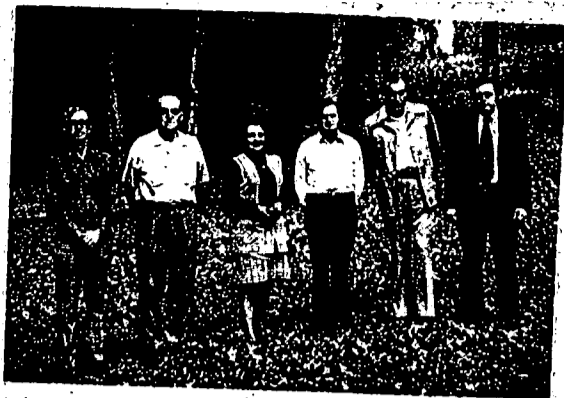
