

Carter, Byrd, And Wampler Win Election In Tuesday's Balloting

Jimmy Carter, the former Georgia Governor who was a virtual unknown two years ago, was elected President of the United States last Tuesday, November 2, in one of the closest and most exciting elections in recent years. Carter defeated the incumbent Republican President Gerald R. Ford of Michigan by returning



the "solid south" to the Democratic camp and winning several key northern industrial states such as New York, Wisconsin, and Ohio.

President Ford, who had all but lost his voice from campaigning, was forced to allow his wife, Betty, to read his statement of concession which did not come until Wednesday due to the election's closeness.

New York City's voting machines were impounded by court order Tuesday night leaving the election in the pivotal state of New York in doubt. The machines were impounded when the total number of votes surpassed the number of people who were counted as they entered the polling places. Ford's concession, however, came when it was realized that the New York situation would not probably change the outcome.

Both Ford and Carter called for the nation to unite and support the new Administration

which will be inaugurated on January 20, 1977.

Across the nation at the Highland Cavalier's Wednesday evening press time Governor Carter had won 297 electoral votes to 241 for President Ford with 99 per cent of the precincts reporting. Carter had polled 40,153,878 votes in the popular tally to Ford's 38,409,505.

The two major independent candidates, Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota and Lester Maddox of Georgia, won no electoral votes but polled 654,976 popular votes for McCarthy and 168,817 votes for Lester Maddox.

Ninth District Congressman William C. Wampler was returned to his seat for the sixth time as he solidly defeated Charles Horne of Abingdon, his Democratic opponent. Wampler polled over 80,000 votes out of the 130,000 votes cast in the District.

Incumbent U.S. Senator Harry F. Byrd, Jr. once again

proved that in Virginia the Byrd name is magic as he drubbed former Admiral of the Navy, Elmo Zumwalt, a Democrat and Independent candidate Martin Perper. Byrd polled over 80,000 votes in his re-election bid.

Voting in Wise County for the most part paralleled the nation as the County went for Carter by 7,108 to Ford's 5,694 votes. Senator Byrd, an independent, carried the normally Democratic Wise County by a small margin polling 5,862 votes to Zumwalt's 5,220 and 497 votes for Perper. In a surprising move Wise County gave a huge majority of 2,422 votes to Republican Congressman Wampler as he polled 7,642 votes to 5,146 for his opponent Charles Horne. This majority was believed in some quarters to have come due to the reaction of Wise County surface miners to statements by Horne concerning Carter's position on surface mine reclamation in

which Carter contradicted Horne: In the last Presidential Debate held in Williamsburg, Va. Carter stated his support for a bill introduced by Congressman Morris Udall and eventually vetoed by President Ford requiring surface mined land to be returned to its original contour and for the breakup of "high walls" left by surface mines in mountainous region. This legislation was opposed enthusiastically by Wise County surface miners who organized a caravan of coal trucks and drove to Washington as a protest of what they felt would be a loss of jobs due to strict reclamation standards. Horne attempted to defuse Carter's statements by stating Carter had worked against the attempt made to override the Presidential veto. Carter promptly denied Horne's statements resulting in a dent in Horne's credibility in Wise County.

Finance Committee Approves Student Activity Budget

The final adjustments were made to the CVC Student Activity Fee Budget and the Budget itself was approved by the Finance Committee this past week. A table of the final budget appears below.

An analysis of the individual organizations' requests discloses some of the particular needs of these organizations. From the athletic department \$9380 was allocated to Men's Athletics, \$6360 went to the Women's athletics, and \$4000 will be spent on the new isokinetic exercise unit.

From the SGA request, the largest item by far is expected to be various concerns at a projected expense of \$18,000. Other expenditures include

formal dances, general dances, and campus improvements.

The Highland Cavalier and the Outpost both projected printing and publication of their work to be their largest expenditures. The Highland Cavalier estimates publication of twenty-nine papers at an estimated cost of \$4560, with other expenditures bringing expected needs to the total noted below. The Outpost estimates a printing cost of \$10,059.67. The Publication, Film, and Lecture Committee expects its main expenses to be the Classical Film Series, Lectures, and Forums.

The Popular Film Series, under the direction of Jim Gott,

has requested, and received, \$3000 to bring entertainment to CVC with such movies as *The Hindenburg*, *Macon County Line*, and *The Reincarnation of Peter Proud*.

These are the major organizational allocations. What one sees by examining the chart below is that the slight adjustment is the SGA's recommendations by the finance committee indicates that the long weeks of hard work and tedious detailing by the SGA have culminated in a precise and fairly distributed budget. The Student Government Association is to be commended for its painstaking endeavors in this project.

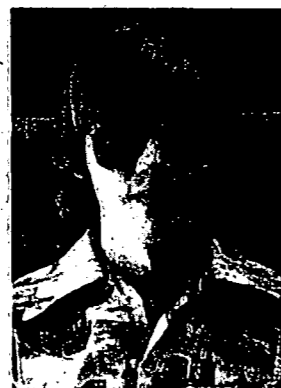

"Candida" Reviewed

An audience of about 30 enthusiastic playgoers witnessed this year's first Reader's Theater production at CVC on the twenty ninth of October. This CVC production of George Bernard Shaw's Candida, directed by Frankie Zickfoose, delighted its viewers with the acerbic wit of Shaw, whose discussion of woman's role in society seems as fresh today as it was in the 1890's. Zickfoose's Candida offered several interesting interpretations of Shawian characters, especially of the lead role, Candida, and of the idealistic young poet, Marchbanks. Interpreted by Eddie

Merrit, Marchbank's bumbling timidity contrasted effectively with the maternal firmness of Sharon Daniels' Candida. These portrayals emphasized the romanticism of Shaw's characters and underlined the marriage bond of Candida and her husband at the end of the play. Michael Donathan as Morrell and Robert Kuhlben as Candida's husband also gave more-than-adequate performances in their appearances on stage at CVC. Nancy Slep and Eugene Ham also provided some effective moments in their supporting roles.

Close Reviews "Natural History At The Appalachians"

There is something profoundly fundamental about these mountains. It seems the earth was showing us the very basis of this planet in those old, weathered, jutting masses of rock. One is constantly reminded of the frailty and newness of civilization in the shadows of these witnesses to the past. Dr. Brook's lecture "Natural History of the Appalachians" underscored these impressions even more.

The Appalachian Mountain Range begins in New Foundland and marches down the east coast, finally fading in Alabama. But the backbone of this range extends only from Maine to Georgia. It takes various names such as the Green Mountains, the Unaka or the Allegheny Mountains, reflecting the many cultural areas it passes through. Dr. Brooks developed this theme early in his lecture, stressing the wide ranging differences occurring in the Appalachians. Dr. Brooks spoke of the Natural habitats occurring in the Appalachians. He revealed that many species of trees and

birds found much further north occur in the higher altitudes along the Appalachians. These "island mountain tops" cannot be distinguished from forests found in New England and Canada, which is of much interest to the southern biologist who wishes to study northern biological communities.

Throughout the lecture Dr. Brooks spoke with much warmth and love for these mountains. He used stories and country jokes to illustrate points in his talk as well as to make the audience more comfortable with what could easily be a very dry subject. I might also add that he had one of the most interesting pronouncements of "illustrate" I have ever heard.

There were many other interesting points that Dr. Brooks covered but the space here is too small to cover them all. Let it suffice to say that he took a very dry subject and made it most interesting for the general audience. I'm sure that those who attended would agree, it was time well spent at the lecture entitled, "Natural History of the Appalachians."

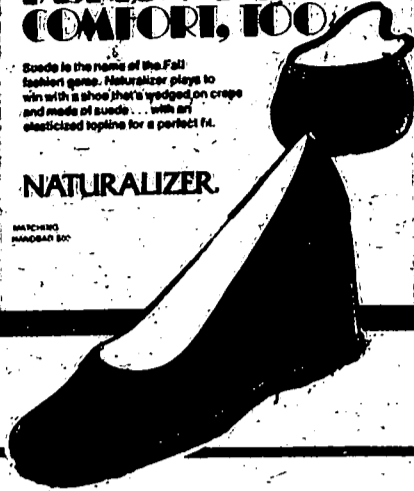

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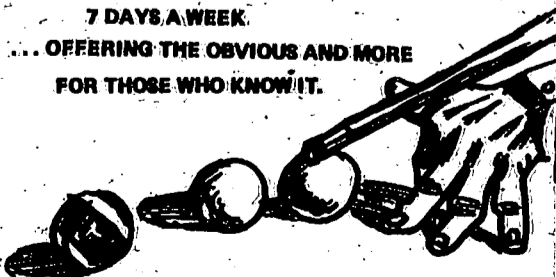
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
