

# Women's Softball Team Wins State Championship

The women's softball team of Clinch Valley College won the state championship last weekend in a series of resounding victories over four other colleges. The Virginia College low Pitch Championship was held on the campus of Virginia Wesleyan College in Norfolk, Virginia on April 25 and 26.

The ladies' first game was with Emory and Henry College on a beautiful Friday afternoon. The CVC team came back from an early inning shortage of runs to tie Emory in the bottom of the seventh inning. Emory managed to capture the victory in extra innings with the final score standing at a close 8-5.

The tournament was a double elimination contest, so the women returned at noon on Saturday to take on the host school on their own field. CVC was highly motivated and effectively annihilated Virginia Wesleyan College by a score of 12-4. The solid defense and excellent batting exhibited by CVC in the game proved to set a precedent for the rest of the day.

After an all too brief fifteen minute breather period, CVC returned to the field for another encounter with Emory and

Henry College. This game was probably the most difficult of the entire tournament as it was hard fought on both sides. Emory was winning by a single run in the bottom of the sixth inning, but CVC caught up at their next chance at bat and held the lead when the game ended. The final score was 7-8 with CVC on top.

Granted another fifteen minute break, the CVC team inhaled McDonald's hamburgers and rested their weary limbs in preparation for their matchup with Hampton Institute. The Hampton team was emotionally charged and quite verbal in their evaluation of the game, but CVC won by a score of 10-8 using a strong defense to harness Hampton's batting lineup which included a rather high proportion of potential homerun hitters.

This victory was the third consecutive one for CVC and with their tournament record at 3-1, they were tied for first place with Hampton Institute. In the final game, Hampton batted first and was able to score a quick pair of runs. CVC batted at the bottom of that first inning and countered with a sequence of four runs. It was in this initial

inning with CVC at bat with a base runner on second that the umpires called a time-out and began a discussion that was to persist for the better part of an hour. Hampton Institute was forced to forfeit the game when it was discovered that by removing the starting pitcher and placing her at third base, they had manipulated the batting order. Hampton pleaded ignorance of the full effect of the game rules, but was unsuccessful in their appeal of the umpire's decision.

Coach Pace praised her team and stated that the emotional togetherness shared by all members of the group proved to be the winning factor in the games. She also expressed her deep appreciation to assistant coaches, Bobby Waddell and Geri Lynn Wallace for their invaluable assistance. I have made many life-long friends and enemies as well, during my stay in the Valley.

To my friends, I am grateful to God for you; I am grateful to you for your friendship and fellowship which was made mandatory if the work were to succeed. I shall never forget your many self-denials as we went about to elect the SGA president, Mr. Richard Frye last year, who has done a marvelous job executing his office in a positive manner. I leave him now with one deep regret, that it was my sloven attitude that cost him this year's election. Nevertheless, life must go on, and

I bid Godspeed to my friend and brother, Mr. Frye. ## Carter Extends Thermostat Limits On Campus Buildings

WASHINGTON, D.C. (CPS)—Faculty, staff and student hopes that campus buildings might be a little cooler this summer than they were last summer were dashed in mid-April when President Carter extended his mandatory heating and cooling restrictions through January 16, 1981.

Carter ordered thermostat restrictions last year in an attempt to force institutions to conserve energy. The restrictions set an upper

limit of 65 degrees for heating during the cold months, and of 78 degrees for cooling during the warm months.

The restrictions were originally scheduled to lapse on April 16.

Many colleges and universities had difficulty meeting the restrictions in all campus buildings. Some students protested when plant managers did meet the restrictions. Washington University in St. Louis, for

example, protested that the 65 degree limit was unfair to an unhealthy for the models who posed nude in the university art classes.

The Department of Energy eventually rejected the university's request for an exemption to the thermostat restrictions.

Energy officials also announced that they will propose the limits become a permanent feature of the nation's energy plan. They will send the bill to Capitol Hill in "a few weeks."

## Men: Get Ready To Shed Your Clothes

ITHACA, NY (CPS)—Following in the footsteps of Playboy magazine's publicity-generating campus search for models, Playgirl magazine has launched a campaign to find male students on Ivy League campuses who are interesting in posing nude for an upcoming photo layout.

"The response has been great," says Playgirl's Kevyn Allard, "except at Harvard and Yale." At these schools, she says, there's been no response at all, not even a negative one.

Conversely, Playboy has managed to stir up controversy on almost every campus it's visited since it published a "Gris of the Ivy League" photo layout last year.

At Baylor University President Abner McCall threatened to discipline any student who posed nude and was identified as a Baylor student. Shortly thereafter, three members of the Baylor Law staff were fired for publishing editorials critical of McCall's stance.

But Playgirl's Allard maintains that none of the controversy, and thus none of the publicity, has plagued Alison Morley, Playgirl photographer and centerfold coordinator, in her campus visits.

This is not the first time,

however, that Playgirl has scouted for models on campus. Two previous layouts—men from Pac-10 schools and Harvard—were very popular with readers. Allard reports, "If all goes well in the Ivy League, "We could very well do other schools."

Although less widespread than the opposition that Playboy encountered on campus, there been some concerned criticism from both male and female students.

Playgirl "condones violence against women," charges Robert Gluck, a member of Cornell University's Men Against Rape and Sexism. The magazine, he says, represents men as "tough, abusive and dominant."

But Pamela Schott took the announcement less seriously. "With Playgirl it is kind of a game, more like a parody," she told the Cornell Daily Sun. "They're doing it to make a point."

The point, says Playgirl photographer Morley, is men should be just as able to pose nude as women.

"I think men will be responsive," Morley says. "We now have a liberated era, where men have the right to show their bodies like women do."
