Gregory Speaks To Phi Beta Lambda

The Phi Beta Lambda Chapter of Clinch Valley College played host to their first speaker of the year on Tuesday, November 25. Mr. C.L. Gregory, Jr., Vice-President of First State Bank of Wise, was the featured speaker for the afternoon.

Mr. Gregory has attended the School of Bank Management at the University of Virginia, the School for State Bank Examining Personnel at the University of Illinois and the Graduate School of Banking of the South at Louisiana State University. He has been at his current position since September of this year.

He focused mainly on answering the questions posed by those who attended the meeting. Concerning interest rates, he foresees no drop in the future. "One to four people dwellings are on the

way out." Every time interest rates increase and then drop back down, the base rate is a few points higher. He stated that Virginia has no usury laws and supports that by saying "the supply and demand of money has a way of setting its own rates. Let's face it, the poor are going to get poorer and the rich are going to get richer."

On a more serious note, Mr. Gregory informed the crowd that First State Bank is looking at a service charge to offset the cost of maintaining personal accounts. At present, they have not such charge but may need to formulate one in the near future. This could mean that some people might be placed out of the market to bank.

Following this most informative meeting, a reception was held in the Chancellor's conference room.

Her Dream May Come True

Deborah Jean Troutt, a 19-year-old CVC student from Whitesburg, Kentucky, was recently crowned Miss Lonesome Pine 1981. With her blue eyes and light brown hair she will journey to the Miss Virginia Pageant held in Roanoke in July in an effort to represent the area well. With a win in the Miss Virginia Pageant, the next step would be the Miss America Pageant in Atlantic City.

Troutt commented, "Every little girl has dreams of being Miss America. I think I've accomplished something and feel proud just to be representing this area. I'll feel disappointed if I'm not Miss Virginia but the feeling of accomplishment will still be there."

Troutt competed against ten area contestants. As the winner she was presented with a \$1,000 scholarship, five outfits from area businesses, a crown, scepter, and orchid, a haircut and style, and a three-month membership at an area health club.

Troutt replied, in reference to why she entered Miss Lonesome Pine, "Currently, I am Miss Letcher County (Kentucky) and I competed in the Miss Kentucky Pageant last summer. I wanted another chance at a state pageant."

The contestants were judged on talent, evening gown, bathing suit, and an interview. Troutt said, "I think all of these factors are equally important in a pageant of this nature. Leaving out one element would hurt the pageant and the girls involved."

For her talent, Troutt sang "The Rose", a song made popular by Barbara Streisand. She intends to sing for her talent in the Miss Virginia Pageant also.

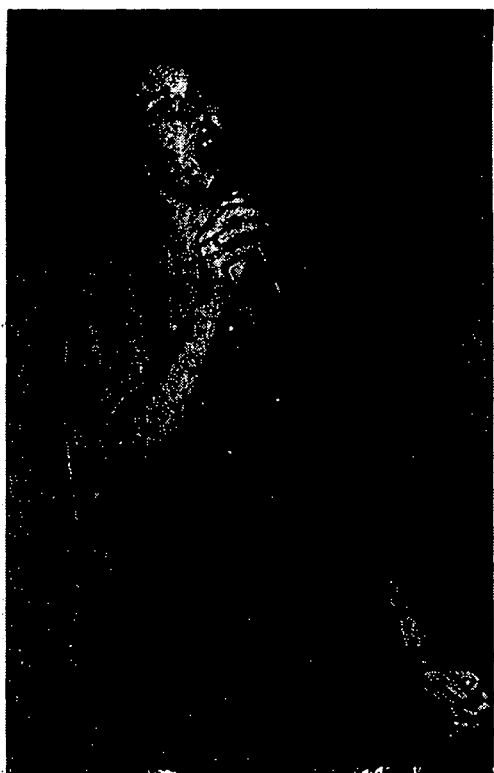
The judges at the Miss Lonesome Pine Pageant are familiar with the Miss Virginia Pageant and have experience in several prior pageants. According to Troutt, "The judges are looking for someone who will represent the

area well. That girl would have to be genuine, intelligent, talented, and have excellent poise. All of these are equally important."

Recalling her first thoughts when the emcee said, "The new Miss Lonesome Pine is Deborah Troutt," she said, "I

was happy and most of all relieved. There is so much pressure prior and during a pageant and after it's over you feel relieved."

Her major is Pre-physical Therapy. She plans to continue in this field even if she is tabbed Miss Virginia.

Don't Forget To Pre-Register



Students may begin making out their Spring Semester Schedules today. A student should meet with his advisor within the week and return the completed schedule to the Registrar's Office.

There are several reasons why a student should pre-register. First, it saves time during registration. If a student has to register for classes before he pays his fee, a lot of time will be needed.

Second, the pre-registration reserves the student a place in the class in the Spring. If a student waits, there may be numerous closed classes and thus cause the student to not be able to take the courses he needs.

Pre-registration also provides the student with a chance to find out what type of courses he will be taking and give him a chance to prepare. If a student has any question concerning a course, I am sure that a faculty member will be more than glad to discuss it with you.

In closing, it is advisable to pre-register. If you don't, it's your fault if all of the classes you need are closed.

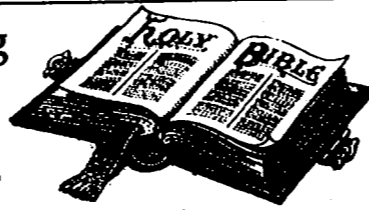

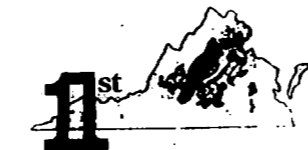

CVC Defeats Berea For First Time

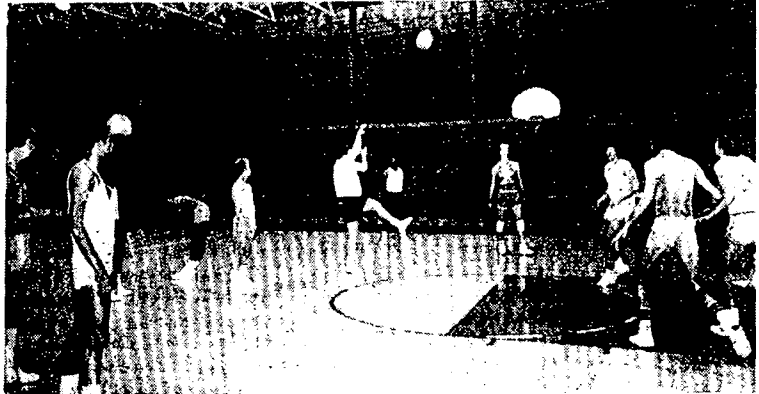
What's this?! There's seven seconds left on the Greer Gymnasium clock and the score reads 78-57. So what, you say. But look! The "78" is under the home side of the score. And that bedraggled bunch of athletes in blue, could that actually be Berea College, a team that has yet to lose to CVC???

It has come to pass. The Cavaliers were even in the KIAC and up one in the hearts of their fans with a 78-57 win that was not as close as the score indicated. The Cavaliers had never looked back the whole game, applying a furious full court press and an intelligent offensive attack. Berea responded to the CVC pressure by throwing the ball away in rather disorganized fashion, tripping over their own feet and being laughed at by the disappointingly small Clinch Valley crowd.

In what had to be the monument of scheduling ignorance, the game, a series of one-act plays and a dance all coincided time-wise. The attendance at the game was small and the noise the crowd made was rather soft. All of this seemed to have no effect at all on the Cavaliers, who were ready to play.

Coach Dave Bentley was extremely pleased with the performance, pointing to how well Barry Hamler (19 pts.), Mike Hoskins (16 pts.), and David Lumpkins (16 pts.) played. It was also remarkable how well CVC came back from the bitter taste of Saturday's home opener, where CVC blew a second-half lead and fell to the Georgetown Tigers 74-68.

CVC's next game is a home outing against Alice Lloyd Tuesday at 7:30. We'll have a report there, plus one on the Cavalier's trip to Atlanta Saturday where they'll take on the Sun Belt Conference's Georgia State Eagles.
