# What Are The SGA's Accomplishments?

During the next weeks a series of articles will be presented in the Highland Cavalier pertaining to the actions, or lack of them, by the SGA.

Over the last week students have questioned just exactly what did the SGA accomplish during last semester. This series, which will interview each SGA member, will attempt to find out what was done and why many

more things were not accomplished.

But first, a bit of news from "The Grapevine." With Mark White going on to bigger and better things, sources have it that Rick Cole will be appointed by a two-thirds vote. Are the votes there? We shall soon see. Feelings are also afloat that if this appointment is passed, Mr. Russ will be relinquishing his post as president. Of course, Mr. Russ will

have a chance to comment on these developments in later articles.

The interviews this week are with Freshman Representative Lauchlin Lee and Sophomore representative, Bruce Gibson.

Lee, when asked about the successes and failures of SGA projects, feels that there has been no failures, but then there were no real successes either. "We have done not a whole lot of anything."

Gibson feels that there has been no successes or failures of exclusively SGA sponsored events. The money given to various organizations were a help but he feels the SGA has failed to its attempt to sponsor things on its own. "Take the Road Rally, for instance. It could have been a success but a lack of any organization prevented it from being a success."

Each representative mentioned that they felt was causing this lack of action on the part of the SGA. Both Lee and Gibson felt that part of the fault lies within the student body, they felt that the students do not make their needs aware to their representatives.

Lee felt a major problem was apathy within the SGA itself. "There is a problem with representatives showing up at the meetings and even so far as the president not showing." These feelings were also agreed upon by Gibson. Promptness was described by Gibson as "pathetic."

Other problems described were such things as when student needs are made aware of there is little or no follow through. The major problem, though, seems to

be the lack of organization, according to Gibson. "Notices of meetings are not sent out to SGA members and it seems special meetings are called without consideration of schedule conflicts of the SGA members."

Both stated there was a problem with procedure during SGA meetings. Each man stated that at times motions were voted upon without a second or even voting on something without a formal motion being made.

Gibson states that Russ is "Unaware of rules and procedures that must be followed and are binding upon the council and himself. This wouldn't necessarily cause the SGA to be less effective but in this case I think it has taken away from the credibility of the SGA." Gibson continued, "Change is sometimes needed and I feel the way the SGA works for the students should be changed, but not the entire format," in reference to last year's attempt to reorganize the student government.

As a last note the SGA meets each Monday at 5:00 in the Administration Building. Students are encouraged to attend.

Lora Carr, Richard Frye, and Wade Turner were the nominees for the position. Richard Frye was chosen over his two opponents by a two-thirds vote.

# Sohn Speaks To Merit Society

Dr. Mary Sohn, professor of Chemistry at CVC, spoke to the Merit Society of the Division of Professional and Social Sciences on Thursday, January 29 concerning the topic of nuclear energy.

Dr. Sohn stated at the beginning of her speech that she was opposed to nuclear reason. The reason for this opposition is the current way that energy is created in nuclear power plants and breeder reactors. The energy is created by fission which involves splitting one atom into two. In the atom's search for stability, energy is released, thus giving us energy for steam which generates electricity.

Dr. Sohn continued by discussing the tragedy at Three Mile Island. Water is used as a cooler in the Three Mile Island power

plant. The problem surfaced when the water drained out. This left the residents of the area with the possibility of a melt down which involves the radioactive material melting the nuclear power plant's foundation and seeping into the ground. Eventually it would have contaminated the ground and the water. Dr. Sohn pointed out that it would take thousands of years for the radioactive material to decompose.

Dr. Sohn, however, stressed that we should conserve our present energy sources and budget money to develop solar energy and fusion power (which involves putting two atoms together). Dr. Sohn sees fusion power as being energy for the future. She stressed that we should have it developed by the year 2000.

## Students - Know Your Educational Rights

The Registrar's Office at CVC would like to inform students of their rights concerning educational records. Due to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, and the Buckley Amendment, effective January 6, 1978, students have the right to:

1. To be provided with a list of the types of education records, as defined in the Act, which are maintained by the College and which are directly related to students;
2. To inspect and review the content of those records;
3. To obtain copies of those records upon payment of expenses;
4. To receive a response from the College to reasonable requests for explanations of those records; and
5. To receive confidential treatment by the College of education records; neither such records, nor personally identifiable information contained therein, will be released without student permission to anyone other than those parties specifically authorized by the Act.

For more specific information on who has the right to see your educational records and where these records are kept, a student may obtain a complete copy of these regulations from any faculty secretary, the Dean of Students' Office, or any student services' office such as the Financial Aid Office or the Registrar's Office.

# Freedom For All Held Captive

A spirit of thanksgiving is in the air. The hostages are free. In a real sense we are free, too. Perhaps this is why the "Welcome Back" for our countrymen and women is stretching out so long. Through their long ordeal we have learned what it is like to be held captive. Or have we?

In pulpits and small groups gathered for prayer and in private

devotions an episode from the life of Christ as recorded by Luke in chapter 4 of his gospel has come into focus. When Jesus, the hometown boy, was asked to speak in the synagogue one Sabbath, He chose to read from Isaiah these words, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has appointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord." (Luke

4:18-19. The Revised Standard Version).

We have invested much of ourselves in trying to understand how the hostages must have felt and now feel. We have our own very personal feelings to deal with in that this happened to Americans and thus to us as well. But can we also feel what the militants have felt and felt? Not well, perhaps yes.

Who are we holding captive? Who are we holding captive because for us to exercise power

over another makes us feel good? Who are we holding captive because their life style is not exactly like ours? Who are we holding captive because of all those prejudicial stereotypes we have allowed to influence our behavior? Who are we holding captive because we will neither forgive or forget past actions?

Are there hostages right here at CVC? It is a very good possibility. For by our judgments we turn the key and lock in those who

"not our kind." It can happen with students, professors, administrators and campus ministers, too. Who are we holding captive? Who am I holding captive? And perhaps we are being held captive not only by others but by our own self-image. The good news is that this doesn't have to be! Let us join with Jesus in releasing all the captives. "And he began to say to them, 'Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing.'" (Luke 4:21. The Revised Standard Version.)

The Lady Cavaliers were outscored by 10 when the buzzer sounded at Christopher Newport

last weekend. The 65-75 final score was a six point spread at halftime but it seemed the Lady Cavs could not outdo the ladies of CNC.

Leading scorer for CVC was Trish Olinger with 19 points, followed by Delcina Wilkerson with 14 points. Wilkerson and Sharon Morris pulled down 11 and 10 rebounds respectively for the CVC ladies. Wilkerson 14; Olinger 19; Morris 8; Osborne 0; Cox 9; Clark 4; Roberts 4; Scott 9.

Across the border line of Kentucky the Pikeville Lady Bears also dealt the ladies of CVC

another loss 60-73.

For the Lady Cavs Sharon Morris pumped in 32 points along with grabbing down 19 rebounds. Also for the women in crimson, Trish Olinger scored 17 points

Trish Olinger, 5'5", Senior, Point Guard, Hazard, Ky.

In attempt to help lead the Lady Cavaliers to the State Tourney is senior guard Trish Olinger who explains, "To get to the State Tournament, the team as a whole must improve in rebounding, mental errors, passing, and shot selection."

The 5'5" Kentuckian does not shy away from her responsibilities though. Restricted from playing four of eleven games due to injury, Olinger has recovered to the point of scoring an average 14.9, shooting 40% and 58% from the field and charity stripe, respectively. Taking 23 in steals and giving 15 assists Olinger reveals, "I've given, but I can give more. I'm not satisfied with what I've given—to the team. I need to improve on defense and on giving 110% of myself in practice as well as games. I feel that I need to better prepare myself mentally for the games."

For two years Olinger has worn the Lady Cavalier jersey, and it seems injury has played its own game with her. Knee and ankle injuries, although they required sitting and watching, not being able to give action on court, Trish feels "you learn a lot sitting on the bench. It helped me see what happens on the court. It's hard sitting on the bench, but depending upon what position you play, watching it on the bench helps."

Commenting on the next home conference games, Olinger points out, "The difference will come in practice—how much we give in practice, especially the support we give to one another."

"I think we lack self-confidence as a team, mainly on sight of the other teams. We've got the best talent and ability of any other team. There is no team that I've seen that we can't beat. We just have to be prepared mentally as well as physically. After a coach gives her all, it is up to the team. Coach Hubbard has done that—I guess it's up to us now."

## Intramural Basketball Rules Released

1. The team captain is responsible for filling out the Intramural game card 10 minutes prior to starting time.
2. The team captain is responsible for furnishing one scorekeeper for each game played.
3. Teams must clear the playing floor immediately upon completion of their game.
4. Teams will be allowed on the floor ten minutes before their scheduled playing time for practice.
5. Time will be kept by an Intramural Assistant. All games will start and end at the same time with the exception of overtimes.
6. All games will be played in two 20 minute halves. The clock will stop only on out of bounds balls and time outs.
7. Each team will be allowed 2 time outs per game.
8. In case of a tie game, a three-minute overtime period will be played to break the tie. One additional time out will be given in the overtime.
9. Substitutions may be made anytime the ball is dead. Substitutes must catch the attention of the officials and be beckoned on the court.
10. Officials may call a technical foul for delay of game in the last two minutes of each half. This includes taking the ball away from a team attempting a free throw and awarding it to the other team.
11. All protests involving rule interpretations must be made prior to the next live ball. Intramural supervisors will act as interpreters. No protest on judgement calls will be honored.
12. Any player removed from a game by an official is subject to suspension from further participation in intramurals for one semester. Any player removed twice during the season is automatically suspended for the semester.
13. A free throw must be attempted 5 seconds from the time the ball is at the disposal of the shooter.
14. N.C.A.A. rules apply in all situations with the exception of the above stated rules.
