Close Presidential Race Foreseen

On Wednesday, April 22, 1981 CVC will hold its general elections for 1981-82. Four candidates are vying for the office of president of the Student Government Association. The Highland Cavalier is presenting each candidate and an interview in which he will state his views, objectives and plans for changes if elected. The candidates are Steve Duffy, Terry Kilgore, Ray Russ, and Rick Whitner.

STEVE DUFFY—Steve will be a senior next year at CVC, majoring in marketing management. He graduated from Pascook Valley Regional High School in New Jersey. He has held several offices in the Phi Sigma Kappa Fraternity at CVC, the current one being the office of President. He feels this experience in leadership gives him a plus in his candidacy for SGA President.

Steve has been at CVC for 4 years and he has some ideas on changes he would like to see on campus. This is one of his motives for his candidacy. He would like to offer the students at CVC an alternative to a just sitting around and partying campus. He feels a large part of the lack of things to do on campus stems from computers being unable to participate in many affairs. He'd like to see them more involved in activities.

One idea Steve has involves a concert deal with Entam in Johnson City, Tennessee. A reduced student rate to several top billing concerts is his idea, if possible. All the students would charter a bus to the concert to insure group participation. "It would give the students something to do other than just stay around campus."

Another addition to CVC he would like to see would be a Lecture Series. Although he recognizes these generally cost a great deal, Duffy feels with a little search some inexpensive, but interesting ones could be found.

Changes that Duffy would like to see deal with the SGA meetings themselves. A more formal air should prevail at the meetings, by not dispensing of the minutes. Occasionally, he said he has seen this happen and he feels the minutes add order to the meeting. Things such as an accurate treasurer's report, absenteeism, and student apathy should be dealt with accordingly.

"I would like to give the students at CVC an appealing alternative to what they are used to," summed up Duffy.

TERRY KILGORE—The second candidate in the race for SGA president is Terry Kilgore, a graduate of Gate City High School majoring in Business & Public Administration with a concentration in political science. Terry has been at CVC throughout the last two administrations and has seen lots of things done, but nothing with long range effects. Terry says he would like to see things accomplished that would last for the next two or three years.

Some changes that Terry wants to see include permanent office hours for the SGA where students can come in and discuss their problems. More organization on projects and cooperation between student and administration are two things that Kilgore would like to see take place.

Kilgore has a list of objectives which he calls the 11 Point Plan. The following list includes his 11 ideas:

1. Keep SGA office hours.
2. Have a road rally on Wednesday or Thursday to insure mass participation.
3. Check on reduced student rates at the Coeburn Cinema.
4. Concerts at little or no cost to the SGA or students.
5. Work closely with the Film Lecture Committee to get speakers for CVC.
6. Have a CVC Olympics to promote student participation in Olympics.
7. Conduct an Organization Participation Week and at the end of the week give an organization of the year award.
8. Have a Talent Jamboree with qualified judges.
9. Sponsor a CVC 10 Kilometer run.
10. Conduct a Homecoming week with activities.
11. Crown a Snowball King and Queen at halftime of Homecoming game.

Kilgore summed up his thoughts on his campaign by saying, "If you want an SGA that just gets by, then vote for one of my opponents. But if you want an SGA that will work for students, vote for me on April 22."

RAY RUSS—The incumbent SGA president, Ray Russ, will be vying for the position again next year. The third candidate graduated from Kellam High School in Virginia Beach, Virginia and is an environmental science major.

Ray's purpose in running this year lies in the selection of candidates for the office. He feels he will provide the best possible alternative. Russ says he is aware of the B.S. that one encounters in the position and in the past has worked around it.

Some differences Russ foresees is the variety on the council. He feels he knows the people on the council that are running for reelection and the new "outsiders" and feels he can work with them. But he says the office is a one-way street, with more input and would like to see that change.

A couple of Ray's objectives include more entertainment for students. He would like to get an increase in the SGA budget for this purpose. The effectiveness of the SGA is proportional to the amount of money it receives, said Russ.

"I realize one of the candidates who I'm running against is being backed by my predecessor both of whom signed the petition calling for my impeachment. I find it ironic to say the least, that at the time no alternative proposals were ever presented either to the students or myself until now when the 'heat' finally cools down."

Ray feels that whatever the outcome, it will be an "interesting" student council. "I am confident that the next student council will be as good, if not better, than this year's. Should I be defeated, the winner will have all my support to insure a smooth transition."

Ray foresees a close outcome due to each candidate's own block of supporters. "I urge all students, as I'm sure other candidates do, to exercise your opinion to vote so that no matter the outcome, the representatives which will be elected will best represent the overall interests and well being of the student body."

RICK WHITNER—The fourth and final candidate in the race is Rick Whitner, a sophomore math

major, minoring in computer science. Rick graduated from Hayti High School and he transferred to CVC from the Air Force Academy, at Colorado Springs, Colorado in spring 1980.

Rick is running for the office because he feels there's a need for someone as president that can get things going and he can fill the job. He feels the SGA should be the leading body of activities on campus and it needs a strong leader to get them accomplished.

He would like to see more student involvement through groups and individuals. An update on the dances, road rally, and intramurals, accompanied by SGA support in athletic activities are some changes Whitner would try to bring about.

An objective of Whitner in intramurals is to set up a student committee to work with and assist Charlie Engle. He feels student interest would be better represented this way. He would like to see a council of the organization leaders on campus, to use the SGA to get the activities together and spread their responsibility among them.

Rick stressed more computer involvement would make things flow better on campus.

"CVC needs a strong president on the SGA to do the job and can communicate with the students and administration. I feel I can do the job if given the chance," stated Whitner.

The Highland Cavalier regrets that pictures of the candidates were unavailable. Three were taken but the other candidate was not.

Three Vie For Vice Presidential Slot

Three candidates are currently seeking election as SGA Vice President. The three include current Vice President Rick Cole, Mark Bledsoe, and Charlie Davis. Cole is a sophomore from Rose

Hill, VA majoring in environmental science. In responding to why he's running for Vice-President Cole said, "I'm tired of hearing about spathy. I hope to remedy that aspect. Being appointed Vice-President this semester has given me insight into the working of the SGA and some of the problems—both internal and external." Continuing, Cole said, "We need to get more than just SGA members involved. We are representatives but we need the consensus of the student body. I will attempt to solve this problem by better informing the incoming freshman and the rest of the student body with a short statement of what the SGA does and how it needs help and support."

Bledsoe is a 20-year-old sophomore from Powell Valley majoring in Math. When asked why he was running Bledsoe said, "Why I'm running and what I'll do are not different. I'd like to see the SGA made more representative. I'd like to foster cooperation with the administration and among the student organization. Furthermore, the SGA shouldn't

try to be the dominant force on campus. We have a multitude of organizations on campus that are better at providing for the needs of the students than the SGA." Continuing Bledsoe said, "People

who live on campus can't be forgotten. Anything we do for them isn't going to be very successful because there's not enough people here to make it successful but we still must do it." Bledsoe then referred to the new Student Union Building by stating, "We'll probably be moving into the new Student Union Building and we need to begin taking care of it early. Anything we do with it in the first year will decide pretty much what will be done with it in the time to come."

Davis, a 20-year-old sophomore from Coeburn majoring in Biology/Chemistry, bases his campaign on two aspects—organization and cooperation. Davis said, "I've heard a lot of complaints in the past because of lack of participation by some of the class representatives. The only time some showed up was when it was in their best interest. We need cooperation between all members of the SGA from the President down to the freshman representative. Some representatives have had no say in the current administration. Usually, only the

President and Vice-President had a say." In conclusion Davis said, "The student body should make use of their class representatives so the government and organizations will do their job."

The President must listen to students from all parts of the CVC community. At CVC, the President may try to ignore the commuters and not represent them. This type of President is undesirable.

These qualities of a President can only be found in Rick Whitner. None of the candidates can accurately claim experience, not even the so-called incumbent, Rick has a mind of his own. He has the strong convictions to represent the entire student body and to place the SGA as his second priority while President. These two convictions coupled with determination to make constructive changes place Rick at the top of the list as the only potential President of the association.

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Social Welfare Program May End

A proposal to phase out the Social Welfare program by the end of the 1981-82 academic school year is now being considered by Chancellor Joe Smiddy. The planning committee, a standing faculty committee which serves in an advisory capacity to the administration, suggested that the Social Welfare Program be phased out but not before discussion at a faculty meeting.

There are several reasons for the suggested proposal. First, the program has never been accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. Being accredited would be beneficial since students graduating from an accredited Social Welfare Program have significant advantages after graduation.

Also, the program has had low enrollment. According to the Registrar's Office, there are nine seniors who have declared a

major in Social Welfare, seven juniors who have declared, and only one sophomore has declared a major in Social Welfare. Jeff Townsend, Professor of Social Welfare, believes that approximately ten sophomores would be going into this field even though only one had declared.

Another contributing factor for the proposal is the resignation of Jeff Townsend. Townsend came to CVC two years ago, but has now decided to resign after this year.

Townsend, however, has suggested a counter proposal. Through the Professional and Social Sciences Division, he has proposed to the Planning Committee to keep the program alive as a major for one more year than suggested by the Planning Committee and then retain a larger number of Social Welfare courses. He also would like for Social Welfare courses to be

used to fulfill General Education Requirements and electives for certain other fields. As of now, Social Welfare courses cannot be used to fulfill General Education Requirements.

At this time it should be stressed that no final decision has been made. It will be discussed at the May 6 faculty meeting and sometime thereafter Chancellor Smiddy should decide about the future of the Social Welfare Program.

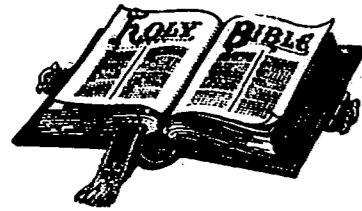

Dock Boggs To Be Held May 9

On May 9, 1981, Clinch Valley College will host the twelfth Dock Boggs Memorial Festival from 11:40 a.m. until dark. This festival is held in honor of Kate Peters Sturgill and Moran Lee "Dock" Boggs, two of Wise County's musicians.

Moran Lee "Dock" Boggs was born in Norton, Virginia, in 1888. His unorthodox banjo style and 1927 recording of "Pretty Polly" brought him to the attention of musicologist Charles Seeger and folklorist

Alan Lomax. Dock later appeared at the Newport Folk Festival and at Carnegie Hall.

Dock's style of combining mountain picking with the blues has been preserved primarily on Folkway records made in the 1940's.

Born in 1907, Katherine Peters Sturgill spent most of her life at Josephine near Norton. She devoted many years to creating songs about home, heaven and family. While being traditional Appalachian in

nature, her music was strongly influenced by the Victorian sentimental ballad.

The Dock Boggs Festival will be a day of music, dance, crafts, and talent contests. In the early evening a traditional country supper will be served.

Admission will be \$1.00 for students, \$2.00 for senior citizens, and \$3.00 for everyone else. Clinch Valley College encourages everyone to come out to the CVC picnic grounds on May 9, to have fun and to help in honoring "Dock" and Kate.

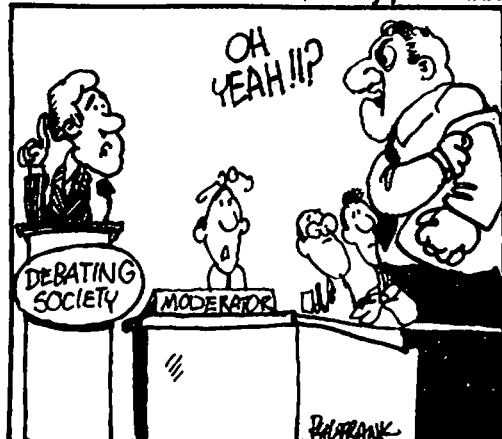
