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## With Record Turnout

# KILGORE COASTS TO VICTORY

A record voter turnout in the General Election on April 22 elected Terry Kilgore SGA President by a large majority. Kilgore received a total of 307 votes. His closest opponent was Rick Whitner who polled 111 votes. Ray Russ, the incumbent, placed third with 85 votes.

Of the 850 eligible voters, 68% (578) voted in the election. Kilgore carried each class solidly. Below is a table of class votes.

Kilgore ran on two aspects—organization on projects and cooperation between student and administration. Also, Kilgore

presented the students with the 11 point plan. Included in this plan were various suggestions to improve student life.

Kilgore's constitutional duties include: (a) seeing that all provisions of the Constitution are faithfully executed; (b) with 23 concurrence of the SGA, appointing all committees; (c) reporting to the faculty at their monthly meeting; (d) preparing a summary of the year's activities; (e) preparing a recommendation of the annual budget; and (f) calling and presiding over all meetings of the SGA.

Commenting on his victory Kilgore said, "I'm happy that the students elected me. I strongly believe that we will have an SGA that will work for the entire student body. I pledge to try extremely hard to see that my entire 11 Point Plan is carried out." Kilgore will take office on May 23 at the Awards Convocation.

## Adams, Still Win

Marcia Adams and Kim Still ran unopposed for the positions secretary and treasurer of the SGA, respectively, and each won handily. Adams, without opposition in her attempt for re-election, captured 250 votes. Commenting on the victory, Adams said, "I'm glad the students elected me to this post and I hope that I can represent the students equally."

Still, without opposition, also captured over 250 votes for treasurer. Still's plans include aiding in budget preparation and keeping an SGA ledger book. Still said, "The job of treasurer will be no easy one but I pledge to be efficient in the office."

Adams' constitutional requirements include being responsible for accurately recording and preserving the minutes of the SGA, conducting the correspondence of the SGA, sending out notices and keeping a list of its members.

Still's constitutional requirements include having charge of all funds of SGA and keeping accurate records of all expenditures and presenting a full financial report at each meeting of the SGA.

## Davis New Vice-President

Davis was declared Vice-President. Davis pulled away from the other two candidates to capture the SGA Vice-Presidency relatively easy. Davis received 178 votes while his nearest opponent, Rick Cole, received 131 votes. Mark Bladesco placed third by polling 105 votes.

Davis, a 20 year-old sophomore from Coeburn majoring in Biology/Chemistry based his campaign on two aspects—organization and participation. Davis felt that more class representatives needed to participate in the SGA and not show up only when it was in their interest to do so. Also, he felt that the student body should make use of the class representatives so the SGA and the organizations will do their job.

In commenting on his victory Davis said, "The student body should be assured

that the new president and I will work closely together. But, for the new administration to be effective, the student body must make their suggestions known by contacting their class representatives."

Class by class, the election for Vice President went as follows:

Mark Bladesco—Sophomores-48; Juniors-32; Seniors-16; Grads-9; Total-105.

Rick Cole—Sophomores-44; Juniors-44; Seniors-16; Grads-17; Total-121.

Charlie Davis—Sophomores-68; Juniors-53; Seniors-34; Grads-24; Total-179.

Davis' constitutional duties include serving as president in the absence of the president and serving as Chairman of the Inter-Club Council.

## No Smoking In Class...?

In addition to electing SGA officers, representatives, and Honor Court representatives on Wednesday, April 22, the students voted to ban smoking by a total of 243 to 184. However, Chancellor J.C. Smiddy said, "The students have given an expression of what they the students would choose to do to the faculty. I do not intend to, at this time, to inform faculty members that they can't allow

smoking. Non-smokers, however, should not be subjected to pollution from smokers. I hope the faculty will adhere to the wishes of the students."

In a class-by-class breakdown, the upcoming sophomores voted 94-61 to ban smoking; the upcoming juniors voted 72-50 to ban smoking; the upcoming seniors denounced smoking 45-24; while the graduating class approved of the referendum, 32-19.

## Razor Edge Races For SGA Representatives

The race for SGA class representatives proved to be the closest races in the General Elections on April 22. However, the seniors only had three candidates for the three seats on the council. Rita France received 49 votes, Cooper Evans-47, and Scott Cooper-45.

The race for junior representatives went down to the last vote. In the seven-way race for three seats, each candidate

received at least 40 votes. Zak Cochran placed first with 62 votes. Sam Chapman won a seat with 55 votes while Bruce Gibson edged out Allen Chadwell by one vote (51-50) to capture the third seat. In order, the other candidates and their votes included Amy Collins, 46, Gustavo Munguia, 45, and Ted Darby 40. Gibson was the only incumbent re-elected by the upcoming juniors. Chadwell and Terry Kilgore were this year's other

representatives. Two incumbents were returned to their seats by the upcoming sophomores while the other narrowly lost. Frank Hodges, an incumbent, received the greatest number of votes with 130. Tim Howard placed second by receiving 114 votes while Lauchin Lee, an incumbent, rounded off the sophomores' representatives by receiving 94 votes. Vernon Williams, an incumbent, narrowly lost with 88 votes.

## Honor Court Races—Little Excitement

With the exception of the upcoming juniors, the race for Honor Court Representatives was decided before the election was held. With three seats and one alternate seat to fill, only three upcoming seniors declared their candidacy. Billy Marshall and Judy Cole each received 49 votes while Brian Dotson captured 42. Renette Huff received one written-in vote and thus was made alternate.

The sophomores also ran only three. Lynn Roberts received 134 votes to lead the pack. Lauchin Lee captured 127 votes and Marianne Laws received 123 votes. No alternate was elected.

Five students declared their candidacy for junior representative to the Honor Court. Valeri Jones led the pack by polling 101 votes. Jerry Kilgore followed with 90, and Walter Littlell received 83 votes. Maurice Nida received 61 votes to become Junior Alternate. Gustavo Munguia received 48 votes. The court will meet soon to elect a Chairman for the 1981-82 academic year. The chairman will be one of the elected representatives for the year.

## 1981-82 "Highland Cavalier" Staff Chosen

The 1981-82 Highland Cavalier Staff has been chosen by the Publications Committee. All three positions on the staff were reassigned to the present Editor, Assistant Editor, and Business Manager. Jerry Kilgore will again serve as Editor. Valeri Jones will hold the Assistant Editor's position, while Sam Chapman will again be business manager. Applicants for the positions included

Marty Libby, who applied for both the Editor and Asst. Editor's positions.

The Publications Committee chooses the staff for both the Outpost and the Highland Cavalier. Members include Richard Peake, chairman, Bill Maxwell, Bill Hooper, Lois Lowery, and Mark Poteet, student representative.

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# Who's Upward Bound

Recently, in the cafeteria line, a CVC student asked me if I was a minister. While I'd certainly be honored to be included in the company of Reverends Jira Cello, Warren Wattenbarger, and Dr. George Aichele, all ministers affiliated with CVC, I'm not. I pondered the why of this flattering compliment for some time before I concluded that maybe it was because many CVC students might not know the meaning of the words "UPWARD BOUND" on my door. This article, therefore, is to acquaint you with the Upward Bound Program.

Upward Bound is an educational program for high school students, usually grades 10 through 12, from families meeting low-income criteria as established by the Department of Education. Its primary goal is to help eligible

students realize and develop their potential as an individual and as a student. Its primary objective is to help these students develop the skills and motivation necessary for success in college.

Upward Bound is a year-round program which consists of a summer component and an academic year follow-up. Each summer sixty Upward Bound students participate in an intensive six-week program. For five and one-half weeks students live in dormitories on the CVC campus and attend classes especially designed to stimulate interest and to improve learning skills. While some classes are centered around academic material (math, reading, writing, speaking), others are planned to provide outlets for creativity (art, music, crafts, photography) and recreation (tennis, golf, swimming, basketball, etc.). The last three days of the

program are spent traveling as a group.

Once the school year begins, the Upward Bound staff frequently visits each student at his high school and provides tutors for those who need academic help. In addition, monthly meetings are held on the CVC campus; each of these consists of a tutorial, plus some type of recreational or enrichment activity.

Individual and group counseling of each student is a year-round part of Upward Bound,

which is designed to offer personal, academic, and career counseling.

All expenses are paid by the program and each student receives a weekly stipend while in residence and a small monthly stipend during the school year. What is asked of participants is a commitment of their total energies to complete involvement in all phases of the program.

In conclusion, Upward Bound is for those students who need help with their academic work in

high school; those who have ability that doesn't show up in "grades;" those who could do better.

It is also for students with good grades who can benefit from a variety of enrichment opportunities. By the way, if you know of a student in your high school back home who could benefit from Upward Bound, let me know his name and high school. I'm always interested in finding good potential Upward Bounders.

## Cavs Win Four, Now 5-16

**SHUTOUT.** Any pitcher's dream became almost every opponent's nightmare at Clinch Valley this week. The baseballers, obviously loose and ready, turned in sterling performances in six games to salvage something out of a season that was headed in the vicinity of Cleveland of San Diego.

In an astonishing display of pitching and defense the much maligned Cavaliers scored 1-0, 1-0, 2-0, and 4-3 wins over Alice Lloyd (twice), Bluefield, and

Pikeville. For a club that was accustomed to being on the short end of double figure scores it was the turn around of the year. It may have been the longest continual stretch of good baseball that there has ever been here.

Of course the record is only 5-16, but that's a big improvement over 0-14. The squad has now won a conference game, and has a good chance to win a couple more before the season ends, which would be a fantastic finish after such a miserable start.


The reasons for the turnaround
