CVC To Lose Counselor

Clinch Valley will be losing a member of its admissions staff beginning with the Fall 1981 semester. Marty Keena, admissions counselor and baseball coach for CVC, will be leaving CVC this spring.

Keena has sent out 75 resumes all over the country and he's in the waiting stage at this point. The three best possibilities point toward the mid-west region of the country. One, in Salem, Oregon, is an assistant director of admissions position. Another is in Santa Fe, New Mexico, teaching special education in an elementary school and a third is at Adams State College in Colorado. This is for a director of admissions position. Although all of these are up in the air, Keena "likes the idea of not knowing." If he's not employed,

he would like to travel to all the Pi Kappa Phi houses in the country and write a book on his experiences.

One of the reasons for Keena's not returning to CVC is the non-renewal of his contract. But, "I'll be back visiting," said Keena. "One lesson I've learned from CVC is to be careful of what one volunteers for." In his new job, he's looking for one with a future, where people get along well and he can respect them. He wants a job he can look forward to going to in the morning."

Marty summed up his years at CVC by saying, "I want to thank all the students for being as nice to me as they have. I don't regret any time I've volunteered here, for I've been repaid in loyalty and respect."

Sohn To Leave CVC

Moves To Florida

Dr. Mary Sohn, Professor of Chemistry at CVC, has announced her plans to leave CVC to teach at another college. Sohn recently accepted a job at Florida Institute of Technology located in Melbourne, Florida. At Florida Institute of Technology, Sohn will be teaching graduate and undergraduate chemistry in the Department of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering.

Sohn said, "At Clinch Valley you get to teach a lot of different things but there I'll be teaching only chemistry. I'll miss variety but I'll be involved in more research."

Continuing, Sohn stated that she had no real problems with her job. However, there are two major reasons for Sohn's departure. First, Sohn really wants to get away from strip mining. Sohn stated, "I really don't understand how people can strip away land without proper reclamation. Just because people

here make a living at it, doesn't make it right." According to Sohn, the only way reclamation is achieved is through federal regulation controls. With the new administration, a lot of federal regulations are being placed in the background.

The second reason Sohn is leaving is the academic standards here. Sohn wishes to teach at a school with higher academic standards. Sohn said, "In too many of the departments things are too lax. The school must place an emphasis on raising its academic standards." However, Sohn did point out that there are some excellent students at CVC. Also Sohn stated that the science department here is very good with standards being extremely high.

In closing, Sohn looks forward to working on research projects in Florida Institute of Technology's active oceanography program and research on Geochemically oriented projects.

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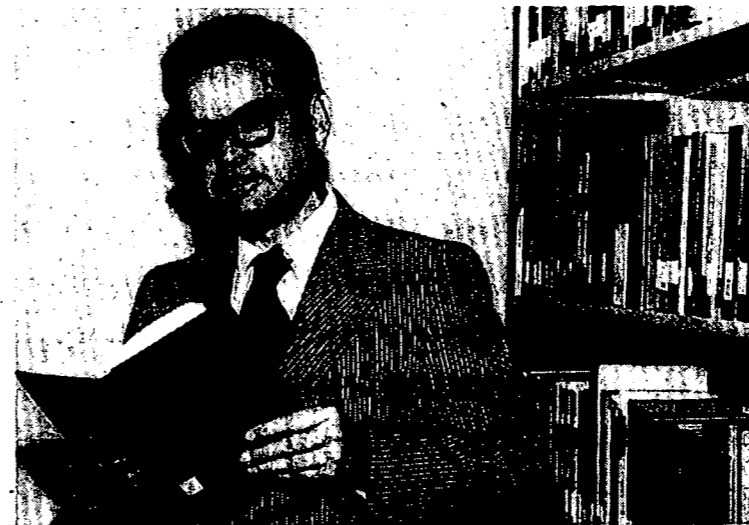
Low Attends AERA Meeting

Lana W. Low, Assistant Professor of Education at Clinch Valley College, was a participant in the annual meeting of the American Educational Research Association held April 13-17 in Los Angeles, California. The AERA is a national organization which promotes excellence in research and development in the field of education on both national and international levels.
She read a paper at the meeting which was excerpted from her doctoral dissertation entitled "The Enduring Effects of First-Grade Teachers on Subsequent Achievement of Their Students." The study attempted to determine whether teachers have lasting effects on their students. Specifically, achievement data for first-grade students were examined to determine which teacher or teachers had students who performed at a superior level in first grade. These students then were followed for a five-year period. While they were expected to continue to exhibit superior levels of academic achievement, the findings of Low's study indicated that students of the effective first-grade teacher did not maintain their superior levels of achievement in subsequent grades. Several explanations of this unexpected finding were examined in the paper.

Mrs. Low holds a B.A. degree in English from Clinch Valley College, an M.A. in Special Education (Speech Pathology and Mental Retardation) from East Tennessee State University, and she received her Ph.D. degree in Educational Research and Evaluation from VPI & SU in 1980. She has been employed at Clinch Valley College since 1974.

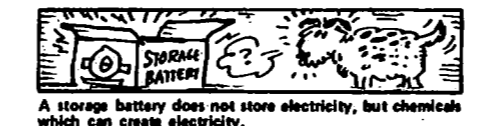

Portuondo Attends Seminar

A National Endowment for the Humanities seminar on Comedy in the Drama of the Spanish Golden Age will be conducted at Duke University during an eight-week period this summer which begins June 15.
A member of the faculty at Clinch Valley College has been accepted as a participant. Augusto A. Portuondo, Associate Professor of Spanish, will receive a fellowship to attend the seminar. Last summer his book, "Diez Comedias Attribuidas a Lope de Vega, Estudio de su Autenticidad" was published and the book now has been bound and placed in the John Cook Wylie Library at Clinch Valley.
The NEH seminar will concentrate on understanding classical morality which held the middle and upper classes in thrall. This morality consisted of an improbable and conflictive combination of Christian ethics, a bloody code of honor, and racist beliefs directed against the New Christians of Jewish ancestry and the Moriscos with their ultimately African origins. The seminar will explore these quasi-Puritan private dreams about the pleasures of free love, adultery, dishonor, and racial harmony as they were publicly expressed in comedies, farces, and the comic relief of serious plays.
Portuondo holds a Doctor of Law degree from the University of Havana and the Ph.D. in Spanish comedy as an imaginative vacation from the strict Spanish from the University of Virginia. He has other publications in hispanofilia and Estudios Ibero-Americanos.

outcome of the conclusion. One of the beautiful tenets of the Christian way of doing life is that what's happened in the past... what's happened so far... does not have to determine the present and future. Day to day, in flight corrections count. It is im-

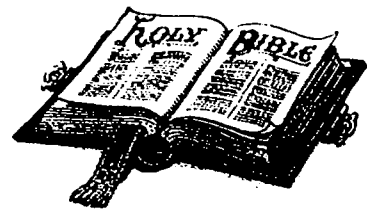
portant to take stock of where we are and what needs to be corrected. The little book of First John gives some good approaches to correcting our course. In chapter 1, versus five through ten, John reminds us of what we know too well. None of us is perfect. All semester, indeed all year or through the four years, we've been getting feedback along those lines. Grades, reactions of our peers, gut-level feelings about ourselves, and conscience all provide some information about who we are and where we are.

The important thing now is what to do with the feedback. Forgiveness is the name for a healthy attitude toward what is as we recognize that we fall short

of what should be. John tells us that the process begins with God. We have God's promise on that. The next step is forgiving ourselves. In reality that may be accepting God's forgiveness. The step beyond that is to make positive corrections in our course, study habits, work patterns, personal lives... The BSU and BIC pens have teamed up to offer just what is needed as the semester draws to a close. How about your choice of black or blue ink in a fine point pen that is just perfect for those term papers, notes, class notes and horror of horrors, exams? The employer wants to know about you in order to make a decision about hiring and you want the employer to know about you so that the decision will be favorable. Dr. Frank Endicott has done a report on college recruiting and within the report is something that will aid you. Listed below are 20 questions asked by employers during interviews with college seniors. Read the questions and formulate your answers. A good interview often determines whether or not you get hired. Remember nothing beats proper preparation.

- 1. What are your long range and short range goals and objectives, when and why did you establish these goals and how are you preparing yourself to achieve them?
- 2. What do you really want to do in life?
- 3. What are your long range career objectives?
- 4. How do you plan to achieve your career goals?
- 5. Why did you choose the career for which you are preparing?
- 6. Which is more important to you, the money or the type of job?
- 7. What do you consider to be your greatest strengths and weaknesses?
- 8. How would you describe yourself?
- 9. How has your college experience prepared you for business career?
- 10. Why should I hire you?
- 11. What qualifications do you have that you think will make you successful in business?
- 12. Describe your most rewarding college experience?
- 13. What led you to choose your field of study?
- 14. Do you have plans for continued study? An advanced degree?
- 15. In what kind of work environment are you most comfortable?
- 16. How do you work under pressure?
- 17. Why did you decide to seek a position with this company?
- 18. Do you have a geographical preference? Why?
- 19. Will you relocate? Does relocation bother you?
- 20. What have you learned from your mistakes?

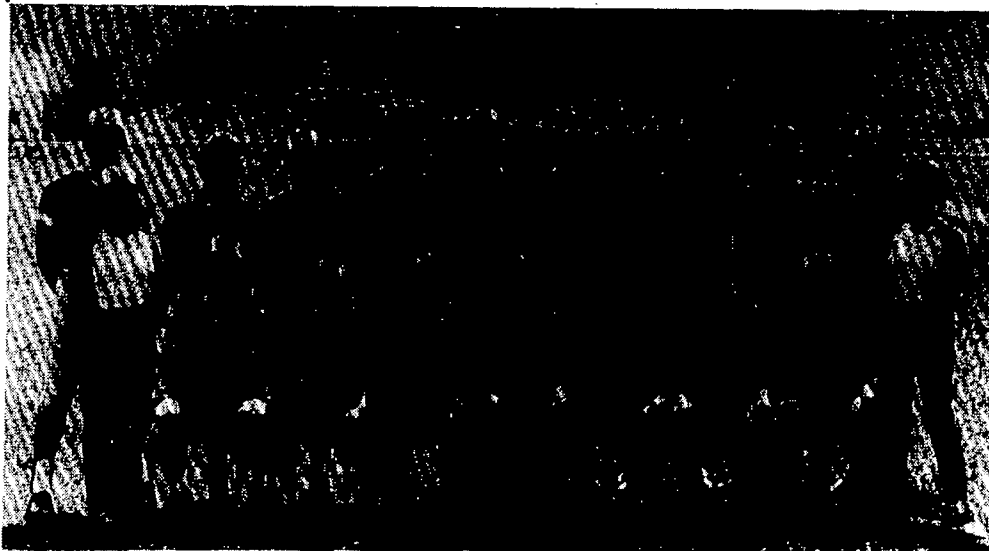
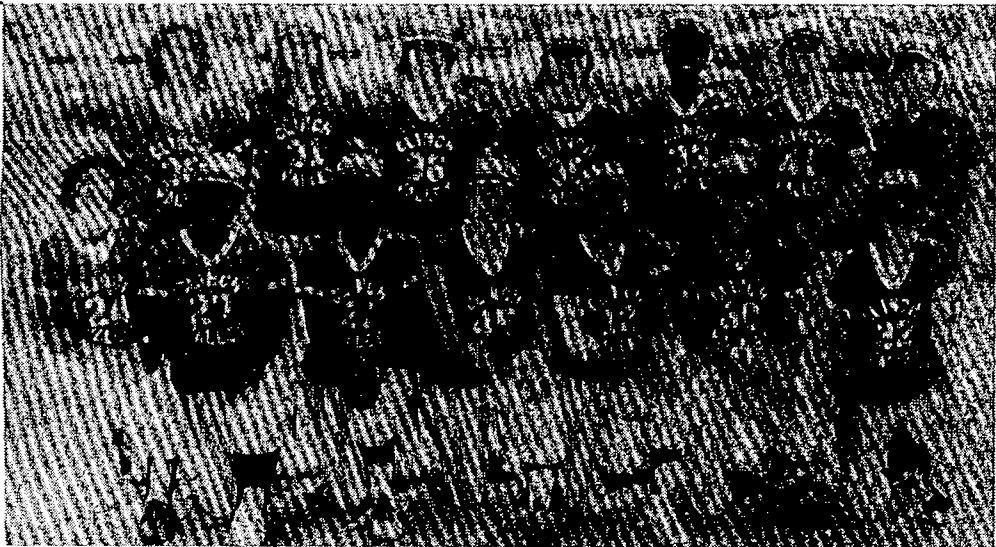
