



Kilgore's Budget Passes Unanimously

The SGA unanimously approved SGA President Terry Kilgore's budget recommendation for the allocation of \$66,000 in student activity funds. However, several organizations were on hand to lobby for additional funding.

The Athletic Budget has always been one of controversy. The 1980-81 budget was \$26,000. However, \$1,000 was to be used to pay off a debt incurred in 1979-80. With this in mind, Kilgore proposed \$37,500 for Athletics, an \$9,500 increase over the past year. Nevertheless, this was approximately \$16,000 away from the request of \$43,968 which would consume about two-thirds of the entire budget. Representatives from the Athletic Department, Basketball Coach Dave Bentley and Tennis Coach Van Daniel, argued that to make it through the year, a considerable amount of money would have to come from outside sources. Kilgore and the council could not see allocating Athletics any additional funds.

A representative from the cheerleaders failed to show at the budget meeting. The cheerleaders requested \$975 to support a squad of 5 women and 6 men. Kilgore proposed \$450 which was the amount they received last year. A surplus of \$525 remained in their account and council agreed that the remainder could be made through their fundraising plans.

Third, the Highland Cavalier submitted a budget which was 10.5% less than last year's approved budget. Kilgore proposed \$4,200 and few questions were raised.

Continuing, Film and Lectures submitted a budget of \$7,500. Following Kilgore's proposal of \$6,900, several council members were concerned with the number of students that attended the films. These members felt that the large sum of money was not justified since the number of students attending these films were few. However, it was unrealistic to cut their budget this year since the contracts for the films had been signed.

The International Club asked the council for \$300 but Kilgore proposed zero. Leuchlin Lee stated, "The international club is for everyone and should receive funding." However, Kilgore stated, "Other clubs on campus such as BSU, Wesley, and the fraternities are for everyone. I'm trying to protect next year's budget from a rash of requests by individual clubs."

Intramurals requested \$2,075. Kilgore recommended \$1,500 which added to the surplus of \$631 would exceed the request.

Continuing, Outpost Assistant Editor Bruce Gibson recommended \$11,000 for funding of the yearbook. After Kilgore's recommendation of \$9,250, Rita Franco, Editor of the Outpost stated, "With hard work we may come close to the amount needed for our yearbook. We have a good business manager (Penny Osborne) and good assistants who will work their hardest for the needed funds." Gibson stated, "It's not enough but there are other organizations who need it more."

Controversy came once again when Pro-Arts requested \$700. Tim Howard, Sophomore representative said, "since the organization was off campus, funding should not be allowed." Daley Portocando, spokesman for Pro Arts, stated, "The Pro Arts expose the students to the Arts and we are not making money." Kilgore recommended \$300 and later \$100 to make a proposal of \$400.

Little argument came when Student Health was awarded \$6,700 after their \$1,954 surplus was subtracted from their request of \$8,650.

"In order to broaden student activities the SGA needs a considerable increase over its 1980-81 budget," Kilgore stated. His proposal of \$7,300 was approved by the Council.

Finally funds were denied the SVEA because the individual club argument once again arose.

When the vote was taken, the council approved Kilgore's recommendation unanimously. The budget now goes to the finance committee for final approval.

Elections Slated September

The election of freshmen representatives to the Honor Court and the SGA will be held on Thursday, September 17. According to the SGA Constitution, freshman must be elected during the Fall semester before the second week in October.

The freshman class will elect four representatives to the Honor Court. From these four, the one with the least number of votes will be designated as an alternate member of the Court. If a vacancy should occur due to the resignation or withdrawal of a regular member, the alternate will then take his position.

SGA representatives from the freshman class will also be elected. Freshman will elect three students to represent them on the Student Council.

A representative for a senior position and the senior alternate position on the Honor Court will be elected. Candidates for these SGA and Honor Court positions should file a declaration of candidacy form with the Dean of Students no later than five days before the elections are to be held. Any candidate for SGA representative must obtain fifteen signatures for recommendation. These forms are available in the office of the Dean of Students.

Any freshman who is carrying at least nine semester hours at Clinch Valley College is eligible to vote in the election. Voting will take place in the hallway just outside the Jefferson Lounge.

Newland Joins Cav's Faculty

Dr. Terry Newland has joined the CVC faculty teaching psychology and social psychology courses. Newland received a B.A. in Social Psychology from the University of Maryland, a M.A. in Human Development and counseling from the University of Maryland and a Ph.D. in Human Development and Statistics from the University of Maryland. In addition, Newland taught for one year and worked in the center for institutional research at the University of Maryland. He was also involved in studies concerning differences in salaries between male and female teachers and differences in salaries between University of Maryland administration and college administration on a national basis.

Newland came to Wise because he wanted to raise his two children in a rural setting. He and his family currently reside on faculty row.

Newland stated, "I was sur-

prised at the cooperativeness of the students. Also, the people are very friendly here and I'm just getting used to it."

Newland feels that it is easier to teach to smaller classes because it's easier to work with the individual student.

Registrar's Office

DROPPING A CLASS—All students should be aware that merely ceasing to attend a class does not constitute official drop. Neither does notifying of the instructor.
Students are permitted to drop a class without academic penalty prior to the completion of 50% of the scheduled class meetings. The student should notify the Registrar's Office in writing of his/her intention to withdraw from college. A student who ceases attending classes and does not officially withdraw will receive a grade of "F" in all courses.
RETURN OF FEES—A student withdrawing within five days after registration shall have his tuition and fees refunded in full, except the sum of \$50.00 to cover the cost of registration. If he withdraws voluntarily after the fifth day of the semester and before the middle of the semester, his fees shall be refunded pro

rata. If the student is requested to withdraw from the College at any time during the semester, or if he withdraws voluntarily after the middle of the semester, no refund of fees for that semester shall be made.
BAD CHECKS—There will be a \$5.00 Service Charge for each check returned by the bank. A student who has an accumulative total of three checks per year will not be allowed to cash any more checks during the year.
PRIVACY OF INFORMATION—Federal legislation (Buckley Amendment) concerning the privacy of information states that students may elect to have their names, addresses and other "directory" information not listed in such a publication. Colleges may publish directory information concerning an individual student if the student does not request his/her information be withheld.
In compliance with this new legislation, Clinch Valley College requests that any student (full or part-time) who does not want to have certain information listed in the directory notify the Registrar's Office by September 14, 1981.

All CVC sports will most likely survive the 81-82 year but after last week's SGA budget meeting, the future of some sports does not look as bright as it once did.

The Athletic Department, under the direction of Bonnie Elosser, submitted a requested budget of \$42,988.12, but the SGA could only see its way clear to recommend \$27,890 for the sports year. This raises the question, how will a \$15,188 cut affect the "sports" program at Clinch Valley? As of this week, Bonnie Elosser and Coach Dave Bentley along with the various other coaches have not made out the budgets for the individual sports.

Contrary to popular belief, Coach Bentley is not the Athletic Director and will not have the final word of approval. "People think that because former Coach Frank Harrell was the director and that I took over his job that I must have taken over the job of director also, but that is not true," stated Coach Bentley. This does not mean that Men's Basketball will not get the bulk of the sports money. They probably will and rightly so because basketball is the major sport at Clinch Valley. But this does mean that spring sports will probably get more money than in the past.

To help ease the money situation, the Men's basketball team will cut their schedule back from 33 to 28 games. "The baseball team, which it looks like I will be coaching will almost definitely cut a few games from

its schedule," added Bentley. "If all the teams will cut back a little, I believe that all of our sports will survive and thrive this year. It would be nice if Clinch Valley could become known for a few other sports as well as basketball."
