Commencement Set On May 23

The 13th Baccalaureate and Commencement for Clinch Valley College will be held on Sunday, May 23, 1982, at Fred B. Greer Gymnasium. There are 98 candidates for Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Science degrees, and two candidates for two-year certificates. An additional 18 students are candidates for August graduation.

The Baccalaureate service at 11:30 a.m. will be conducted by W. Hall Burton Greer, Principal of Jenkins Middle-High School and Minister of the Lothair Church of Christ. Greer holds a B.S. degree from the University of Tennessee and an M.A. from East Tennessee State University. He is a member of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, Kentucky Association of School Administrators, Board of Directors of Jenkins Kiwanis Club, and the Clinch Valley College Advisory Committee.

At 2:00 p.m. the graduates will move from the Zehmer Building down the long steps to the gymnasium where they will be awarded degrees by Chancellor Joseph Sudddy.

The commencement address is by E. Jean Walker, President, Virginia Highlands Community College. Walker holds a B.A. in history from Furman University, an M.A. from the University of Florida, and the Ph.D. from Florida State University. Prior to

her appointment as President of Virginia Highlands Community College in Abingdon, she served at that institution as Dean of Student Services and Dean of the College. She also has taught at Florida State University and Breard Junior College.

A graduation-eve Awards Night program will be held Saturday evening, May 22, to honor students who have excelled in various disciplines. Among them are Two-Year Honors, Darden Society, Who's Who in American Colleges and Schools, Public Service Awards, Merit Society, fraternity awards, Freshman chemistry award and senior accounting award. Chancellor Sudddy also will install Terry Kilgore of Gate City who recently was re-elected President of the Student Government Association for the 1982-83 year.

College-Community Choir To Perform

The College-Community Choir, under the direction of D. Michael Donathan, Assistant Professor of Music at Clinch Valley College, will present its annual Spring Concert at 3:00 p.m. on Sunday, May 16, at J.J. Kelly High School Auditorium in Wise. Kathy Stewart, part-time instructor in Piano at CVC, is accompanist for the Choir. The public is cordially invited to attend. There is no admission charge.

The College-Community Choir, organized in 1978, is comprised of Clinch Valley College students, faculty, and staff, as well as individuals from the surrounding communities of Wise, Norton, Founds, Clintwood, Coeburn, St. Pauli, and Big Stone Gap in Virginia, and Jenkins and Whitesburg in Kentucky. The Choir presents concerts each year in December and May.

For this concert, the Choir will present the Schubert Mass in G with Kathy Eppes, part-time instructor in Voice at CVC, and Bonnie Mullins of Wise as soprano soloists; James Gage of Jenkins, Kentucky, as tenor soloist; and John Powers of Coeburn as bass soloist. The Mass, composed in 1815, will be sung in Latin. In addition, the Choir will present choral works by the American composers Randall Thompson and Vaclav Nehybel, and the English com-

poser John Rutter.

The Show Choir, comprised of select members of the College-Community Choir, will present jazz and Broadway show selections choreographed by Anna Peacock Bettendorf. Also, Broadway show selections will be presented by CVC students

Teresa Elkins, Deby Baker, and Minnie Gillenwater; Holly Pennington of Wise, and Henry Stout, Jr. of Norton. Accompanying the Show Choir will be CVC students Elizabeth Jordan, Piano; Chris Russell and Mike Krochalis, guitar; and Chris Henson, percussion.

Cavaliers Tennis Third In KIAC

Season Ends

The Clinch Valley College Men's Tennis Team ended regular season play with matches on May 3 and 4. CVC traveled to King College on May 3 and emerged with a hard-fought 6-3 victory. "We had beaten King earlier by a 7-2 score," said Coach Van Daniel. "The team seemed to be overconfident going into the match. It was not one of our best played matches." CVC split singles 3-3 and then swept all doubles to take the match 6-3. Winners in singles for CVC were #1 Kevin Howard over Bill Scott 3-6, 6-4, 6-2; #2 Greg Cole over Jeff Carr 6-1, 6-1; and #3 Kenny Beverly over Mike Simmons 3-6, 6-3, 6-1. Winners in doubles were #1 Howard and Beverly over Scott and Ridenour 7-5, 6-3; #2 Cole and Allen Wallace over Simmons and Whiteside 4-6, 7-6, 7-6; and #3 Terry Kilgore and Jerry Kilgore over Boone and Walhall 6-3, 7-5. On May 4, CVC hosted Emory and Henry College and was defeated by a score of 8-1. Terry Kilgore at number five singles picked up CVC's only point by defeating Jeff Twesbury 6-1, 4-6, 6-3. The loss to Emory and Henry brings CVC's final season record to 9-7. Commenting on the season, Coach Daniel said, "I am happy with our season. We started the year with four players with no college experience and three players with not competitive experience. We have steadily improved and our record speaks to the hard work and dedication of the team. I have enjoyed working with them."

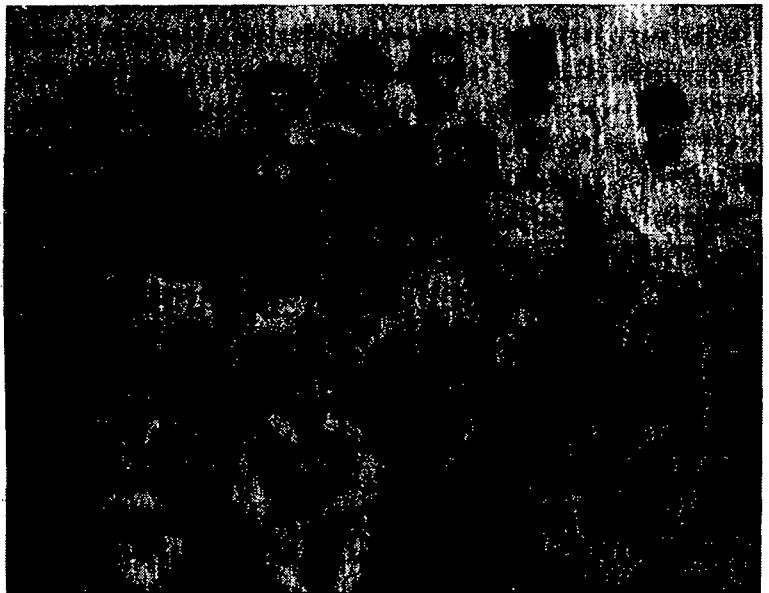
KIAC Tournament

The Clinch Valley Men's Tennis Team finished third in the KIAC Tennis Tournament held at Georgetown College on April 27-28. "I was really pleased that we did so well in the tournament," commented Coach Daniel. "We also finished in third place last year with a more talented and experienced team. The team has steadily improved all year and the players have shown a great deal of enthusiasm. I have enjoyed working with them this season. We're looking forward to the district tournament on May 8 and 7. The District competition will be tougher than the KIAC. Both Asbury and Transylvania have good teams and are not in the KIAC." Two CVC players reached the finals in singles. Freshman Kevin Howard reached the finals at number one. He lost to last year's District 32 champion Mirl Searcy of Campbellsville 6-1, 6-4. Senior Kenny Beverly also reached the finals at number three. He lost to John Pratt of Thomas More 6-1, 6-0. Other players winning points for CVC were Terry Kilgore at number five singles, Jerry Kilgore at number six singles, Kevin Howard and Kenny Beverly at number one doubles and Greg Cole and Allen Wallace at number two doubles. Calculator Course

Efficient use of a pocket calculator is the objective of a one-credit course scheduled for the first eight weeks of the fall semester. Listed as PHSC 100 Calculators, the course meets Wednesdays and Fridays, Block 6 (1:40 p.m.). It is designed to teach each student how to use his or her own calculator most effectively. Students with relatively simple calculators will learn procedures and shortcuts that will make their calculator more powerful in their hands. Those with advanced calculators will learn how to put those advanced keys to work for them. Naturally, students must have a calculator, of one sort or another, to use in the course.

"It's unfortunate," said instructor Bill Hooper, "how many people can't do anything with a calculator but add, subtract, multiply, or divide two numbers. The tool is so much more powerful than that. I hope to show students how to make use of that power to simplify their work and make it easier." The course is intended for anyone with a need to do a lot of arithmetic such as students in accounting, business, economics, and science, or for those that simply want to use the calculator in everyday pursuits such as balancing their checks books or computing their GPA.

The Skies Over Clinch Valley

Dr. William Hooper The final observing session at the Clinch Valley College observatory was another success as about a dozen visitors reviewed the Moon, Jupiter, Mars and Saturn. A high haze interfered with viewing somewhat, but fortunately, the Moon and three bright planets were in the sky. All were bright enough for us to see through the haze. Mars was small and did not reveal many features, but Jupiter revealed several cloud belts and the four biggest moons. Saturn with its rings was seen distinctly and was spectacular, as usual. There are no plans for regular weekly observing sessions for the summer. But it is anticipated that the program will resume in August when the Fall semester begins.

For observers who wish to view the planets this summer, Saturn will remain in the evening sky until September, gradually moving further west. Jupiter will do likewise but will remain in the evening sky until October, and Mars will be around until well into 1983, although getting progressively fainter. Mercury is now in the very early evening sky and might be spotted near the western horizon shortly after sunset. By mid-May it will rapidly become too close to the setting sun to see. Venus is in the morning sky and will shine brightly for a short while before sunrise until August.
