## Robb Announces Fellows Program

Governor Charles S. Robb has announced that the Governor's Fellows Program, first created in 1982, will be repeated in 1983.

The program offers experience in the processes of state government to talented and highly motivated young people. As a result of their experience, Fellows may be attracted into careers in government or public service. The program also should serve to strengthen ties between the state government and Virginia's academic community, and is designed to bring fresh ideas into the Governor's Office.

Students must be graduating seniors or enrolled as degree candidates in a graduate or professional school. All students who are enrolled in a Virginia college or university may apply, regardless of state of residence; and Virginia residents who are enrolled in out-of-state institutions also may apply.

An applicant who is selected as a Fellow must be willing to commit at least two months to full-time work in the Governor's Office, normally from June 1 - July 30, 1983. They will be assigned to work with members of the Governor's Cabinet or personal staff, depending on needs and background and experience of the Fellow.

Applicants should submit a letter of application, a resume, and transcripts of undergraduate grades and graduate school grades, if any. Letters of recommendation also are helpful. The application should include, either in the letter or the resume, the following information:

Name, address, telephone number.

Schools attended (with dates) and degrees, if any.

Extracurricular activities.

Awards and recognitions.

Work experience.

Voluntary community activities.

Other information, such as publications, leisure interests, etc., also may be submitted.

Applications must be received by February 1, 1983. They should be sent

to: Governor's Fellows Program, State Capitol, Richmond, Virginia 23219.

Letters of recommendation should be sent directly by the recommender, to the Governor's Fellows Program, rather than being submitted by the applicant.

## Sheldon Joins Faculty

Garrett W. Sheldon has joined the faculty of Clinch Valley College as Assistant Professor of Political Science, effective with the beginning of the 1983 spring semester. His teaching assignments are in constitutional law, public administration, state and local government.

Sheldon has a B.A. degree from The University of New Mexico and an M.A. from Rutgers University. He has completed requirements for the Ph.D. degree which he will receive from Rutgers University in spring, 1983. Additional graduate study was at The New School for Social Research in New York, and Princeton Theological Seminary.

He has been an instructor in the Honors Program at The University of New Mexico, conducting interdisciplinary reading seminars. He was a summer session instructor in American politics at Rutgers College, an adjunct professor at Douglas Col-

lege, Rutgers, and a teaching assistant at Livingston College, Rutgers, and Rutgers College.

He has worked as a research assistant at Eagleton Institute of Politics; as a public opinion survey interviewer for the New Mexico Marketing Research; as assistant for The National Endowment for the Humanities Seminar for College Teachers on Religion and Politics; and as Editorial Assistant for *Political Theory: An International Journal of Political Philosophy*.

Sheldon's publications include review articles in professional journals and *The Complete Anti-Federalist* edited by Herbert Storing, and articles in the *Journal of Religious Thought, The Independent, and Dialogue*. His dissertation is "Classical and Modern Influences on American Political Thought: The Political Theories of Thomas Jefferson."

## P.R. Office To Close

The Office of Public Relations staffed by Sharon Daniels will be closed as part of the compliance of the College with the 6% reduction in funds budgeted for the College by the State for 1983-84. Ms. Daniels, an employee of Clinch Valley College for twenty years, will be transferred to a new assignment in the CVC Library. Public relations for the College will be handled jointly by Margie Schoenewald and Elaine Womble.

When asked about the change, Ms. Daniels' reac-

tion was one of concern that without full-time staffing, it will be difficult to continue the same level of public relations activities as in the past. The transfer to the Library will provide additional challenges to Ms. Daniels in a career that has included Receptionist, Secretary to the Faculty, Secretary to the Dean of the College, and Public Relations Director. Ms. Daniels will assume responsibilities in the Library formerly held by Jean Jackson who returned to college to pursue a Master of Library Science degree.

## Report From Richmond

The 1983 "Short" session of the Virginia General Assembly began Wednesday, January 12, 1983, in Richmond, Va., and Senator John C. Buchanan is happy to be there representing the people of the Fortieth Senatorial District.

This is Senator Buchanan's 12th year of service in the General Assembly. Due to his seniority and commitment he has received several prestigious committee assignments which benefit our area: finance, rules, general laws, privileges and elections and education and health.

The first order of business was the convening of both Houses of the assembly where new members were sworn in. In the Senate there were two additions to fill the vacancies created by the recent election of Rick Boucher and Herb Bateman to congress. Respectively, these vacancies were filled by our neighbor from Abingdon, Jim Jones, who Senator Buchanan had the pleasure of introducing, and Robert C. "Bobbie" Scott from Newport News, a former delegate.

During a joint session of the Senate and House of Delegates Governor Robb delivered his State of the Commonwealth Address. Calling for a "Spirit of Calculated Hope" in the face of serious economic problems, Governor Robb told Virginians that state government must cut spending to keep its fiscal house in order and deal with "The enormous human costs of this recession." His proposed reductions are: Freezing state employee salaries, cutting aid to education by \$20

million and trimming a number of state services by 6 percent.

Although the state's budget difficulties draw most of Governor Robb's time he also recognized the high unemployment throughout the state and especially in our coalfields.

In other proposals, Robb asked the assembly to:

\*Raise the beer-drinking age to 21 "to reduce carnage caused by drunken drivers."

\*Defer action on a coal slurry pipe line because of the complexities of the issue.

\*Extend for a year the moratorium on the mining of uranium, scheduled to expire July 1.

\*Allow earlier parole for non-violent criminals to make more room in Virginia's prisons for violent offenders.

\*Approve Virginia's

## Privacy Of Information

Federal legislation (Buckley Amendment) concerning the privacy of information states that students may elect to have their names, addresses and other "directory" information not listed in such a publication. Colleges may publish directory information concerning an individual student if the student does not request his/her information be withheld.

In compliance with this new legislation, Clinch Valley College requests that any student (full or part-time) who does not want to have certain information listed in the directory notify the Registrar's Office by Monday, February 7.

## Students-Know Your Educational Rights

The Registrar's Office at CVC would like to inform students of their rights concerning educational records. Due to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, and the Buckley Amendments, effective January 6, 1976, students have the right to:

1. To be provided with a list of the types of education records, as defined in the Act, which are maintained by the College and which are directly related to students;
2. To inspect and review the content of those records;
3. To obtain copies of those records upon payment of expenses;
4. To receive a response from the College to reasonable requests for explanations of those records; and
5. To receive confidential treatment by the College of education records; neither such records, nor personally identifiable information contained therein, will be released without student permission to anyone other than those parties specifically authorized by the Act.

For more specific information on who has the right to see your educational records and where these records are kept, a student may obtain a complete copy of these regulations from any faculty secretary, the Dean of Students' Office, or any student services' offices such as the Financial Aid Office or the Registrar's Office.

## Cavs Down Thomas More 91-87; Fall To Berea, 82-64

Last Wednesday night the CVC Cavaliers held on to a small lead to defeat the visiting Rebels of Thomas More by a 91-87 count. Four Cavaliers, led by star post player Terry Edwards, scored in double figures. Edwards poured in 28 points, followed by Eddie Whitaker with 20, Steve "Cherokee" Dowdy with 19, and Reggie "Issac Hayee" Bryant with 14. Edwards also dominated the boards, pulling down 11 rebounds. Ernie Smith had 8 assists on the night as the Cavs shot a heated 58% from the field.

Last Monday night was a different ballgame, however, as Clinch Valley

fell victim to Berea College, losing 82-64. The visiting Mountaineers shot a blistering 60% from the floor, while the home-standing Cavaliers could muster no better than a cool 45%. A bright spot for the Cavaliers, though, was the sharp playing of guard combo Dowdy and Ernie Smith. Dowdy pumped in a team-high 20 points, while Smith set a new CVC record for assists in a single game with 14. Smith also added 11 points in the effort.

Clinch Valley now goes to 7-7 on the year and will try to improve on that as they host KIAC foe Alice Lloyd in Fred B. Greear gymnasium this Tuesday night.

In the past three games Walton had made a total of 51 rebounds. Horton scored 23 points in the game against King. Susan Hamilton and Jennifer

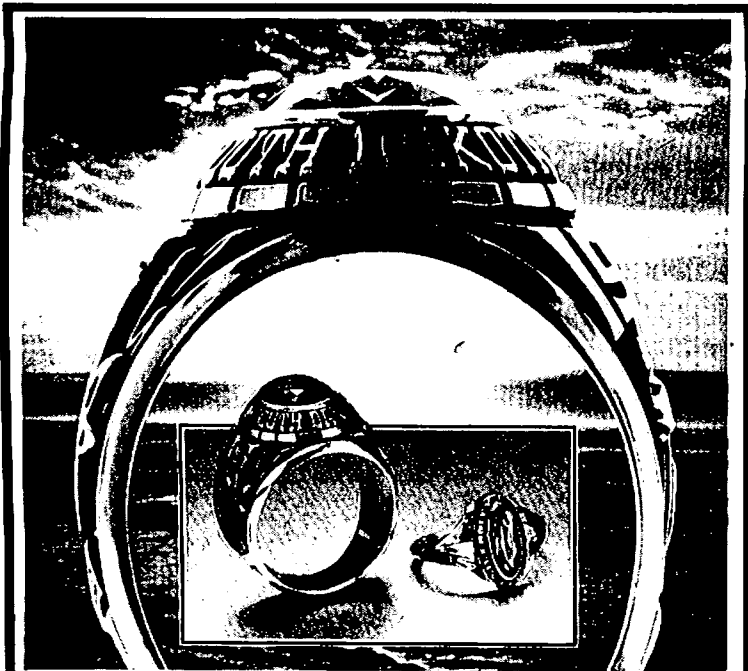
