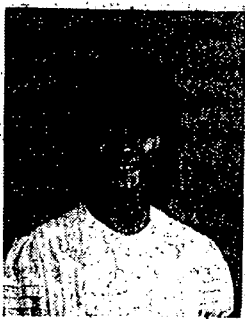
students, faculty, and the SGA - something we desperately need here at CVC. I also feel as though CVC commuters are

Our guest's education includes a B.A. from Weynon College in Political Science, Summa Cum Laude, Highest Honors in Political Science, graduate work at Cornell University, and a Ph.D. from the Department of Government at Harvard University. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

## Lee explains purpose of CVC Honor Court

Living on CVC's campus lends itself to many opportunities and experiences, as many of you well know. What many people do not realize is that along with those opportunities comes a certain number of responsibilities too. One cannot attend a college, whether living on campus or off campus, and not be involved in some way. And as part of that involvement incur certain responsibilities. We, as students of Clinch Valley College cannot simply go through four years believing that we do not owe anything to anyone, or feel that we are void of any other responsibilities other than completing requirements for a degree. A college is much more than this. Certainly one of the college functions is to provide an education through various experiences, but part of its purpose transcends even the books and microscopes. When one goes to college one is expected not only to gain knowledge, but to grow and mature too. It is an on-going process that involves not only administration and faculty, but friends, clubs and organizations. It includes commitments. It means becoming involved.

I have lived on this campus for almost eight semesters now and have been involved in various activities ranging from student orientation leader to the prosecutor of the Honor Court. Many of those who know me know that I place a great deal of emphasis on clubs and organizations on this campus, but there is one that is of special interest to me, which in past times has not received the vote of confidence and recognition that it should receive from the administration, faculty and students. This organization is the Honor Court.

In any collegiate setting where hundreds of students come from many different backgrounds or life styles

there will obviously be those present in the student body who will not possess the integrity that others do. This coupled with the recognizable fact that there must be codes and ethics by which to grow leads us to the belief that there must be a governing body for the purpose of not only enforcing those codes and ethics, which everyone agrees to abide by when he or she accepts the invitation to come to a college, but should also serve as an educational instrument. Clinch Valley College is fortunate on that the student body has the right to choose representatives from each class to serve on the Honor Court.

As I have stated before, one cannot be involved and not have responsibilities. The people who serve on the Honor Court have the responsibility of listening to a case, going through and understanding all the evidence that is presented, rendering an unbiased decision by majority vote of its members, and handing down an appropriate sanction. The prosecutor has the responsibility, as the representative of the student body, of investigating all the facts of an alleged violation, decide if there is enough evidence to positively indicate that there was such a violation, and present it to the Court. Conversely, the student body has the responsibility of abiding by the Honor Code, which includes not only lying, cheating, stealing, plagiarizing, etc., but reporting those who do. I am not saying go out and police the campus for violators, but if one does see something happen, it should be reported to prosecutor, a member of the Honor Court, the Dean of Students or a professor. I am of the belief that even the faculty should support the Honor Code, and not just take an Honor Code violation into their own hands. In the past two semesters, the Honor Court has been supported more by the professors, and I

hope they will continue to do so.

During my three years of association with the Honor Court I have seen several recurring violations, or excuses for the violation. The excuse "I don't know" is not a valid one. If you have not before, grab your copy of the code and look at the Honor Court Constitution. It spells out your right as well as what you can't do. It is all common sense. If I were to choose the most commonly occurring violation, I would say that it is plagiarism. If you aren't sure what constitutes plagiarism, ask the English Department or look it up in the Harbrace Handbook. Too many people get into trouble because of carelessness, or they think the professor can't catch them plagiarizing on a paper.

Everyone knows the difference between right and wrong. Those elected to the Honor Court are there to ensure that the rules are followed. I challenge the newly elected Honor Court to try to create and maintain, along with the faculty and administration, an atmosphere of academic excellence. As a closing, I would like to leave everyone with a thought. If you are tempted to cheat, or steal, or plagiarize, as I am sure that everyone is at one time or another, stop and think. Is it really worth it? Is the goal justified by the means? If you are caught you not only placing yourself in an embarrassing situation, to say the least, but you also put those friends who you elected to the Honor Court in a position that cannot and must not be compromised. It isn't fair to place your friends in that position. I realize the Honor System at Clinch Valley College has "wrinkles that need to be ironed out," but it can be accomplished only by the full cooperation of all concerned. It is everyone's responsibility.

Congratulations to the incumbent Honor Court on a job well done, and good luck to the newly elected Honor Court!

Tuesday, April 3 at the Merrimac Inn in Abingdon, Virginia. The awards are presented annually to graduating seniors who have demonstrated exceptional competence in chemistry and who are likely to excel in some chemistry related career. Ms. Greene received a Merck Index and a certificate recognizing her achievement.

In his introduction, Van Daniel said, "Karen has been at Clinch Valley College for four years. Her work has been consistently excellent. She will graduate in May with honors in chemistry and with a 3.9 GPA. She was the recipient of our Freshman Chemistry Award in 1978. Her honors project is one of the best that I have supervised. I expect her to continue her excellent work."

Kilgore: I feel I can serve the student body better because of my past experience in dealing with the administration and carrying out student activities.

While in college, Steve was on the student life committee, active in intramurals, and a member of Phi Beta Lambda. Steve's hobbies include scuba diving and landscaping.

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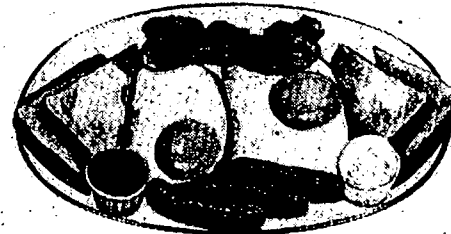
## Sig Sisters to sell goldfish

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

## Baseball team falls in doubleheader

After winning three out of four games over the past weekend, the Cavalier baseball team suffered a disappointment Wednesday when they fell to Kentucky State in a double-header.

In the first game, the Cavs trailed 4-0 until the bottom of the 4th, when Joe Stallard slammed the ball outfield for a double and Tom Gilliland knocked Joe home with a fence-hitting triple. Timmy Owens then followed with a single, bringing in Tom and making the score 4-2.

Rallying in the seventh, after Kentucky State's two-run homer, the Cavs brought

In three more runs, amid much shouting and applause from the CVC dugout and fans.

Unfortunately, however, when the game was finished, Kentucky State had won by the narrow margin of 8-5.

In the second game, both scores remained at zero until the top of the 6th, when Kentucky State scored the first run. The Cavs, in turn, brought in a run in the bottom of the 7th, sending the game into extra innings.

The Cavs were finally forced to accept defeat, however, when Kentucky State, after yet another home run, won 3-1.

Baseball pitcher Bo Stuart hopes year-round exercise will improve his game.

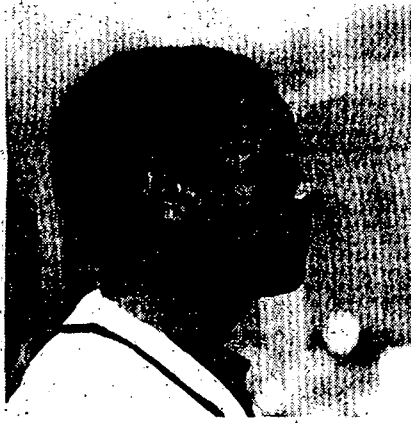
