Moomaw views college as route to growth, maturity

Like most administrators, Clinch Valley College's new chancellor has a broad mission.

But rather than seeing

education solely in terms of a student's classroom experience, Dr. Edmund Moomaw's mission for CVC encourages independence. It promotes growth, maturity,

It seeks participation.

According to Moomaw, the experience a student finds at CVC should foster adulthood. In fact, Moomaw believes that everything the institution does should be related to a student's flight from immaturity and close-mindedness.

Attending college allows students to "discover themselves, to grow gradually... (and) under a certain amount of supervision, to become responsible citizens," he said.

A firm proponent of residential college life, the new chancellor feels it is very important for students to make that sometimes heart-rending experience of leaving home. Going to college is the "time to cut the apron strings," he said.

"Students need to come to college, live in a dorm and stay there." It is the

New Dean of Students desires to be liason among students and administration

For starters, he has 17 years of experience at CVC. He has a working knowledge of how the institution operates. He is a man with great organizational qualities. Add a high energy level. Top that with the desire to "take care of students as people," and you have Mike O'Donnell, CVC's new Dean of Students.

O'Donnell feels his "first responsibility is to be a good liason among students, faculty and the administration." He desires to serve as a "buffer zone" in the sense that students will choose to come to the Dean of

Students first instead of contacting other places.

When can a student come to O'Donnell? Anytime. "If it needs my attention, at any hour, then I should be contacted," he replied. O'Donnell describes himself as having the "ability to get along with people," as being a "good listener and a willing sympathizer."

A new Dean of Students doesn't necessarily mean a change in policy. Students can expect "consistency," O'Donnell stated. He said that he "consulted with Bonnie Etkesser, (former

Deadline for honors project application September 15

Students who will be seniors this year and may be interested in graduating with honors should be aware of the policy on graduation with honors which follows:

In order to graduate with honors a student must be in the top quarter of his/her class and must complete an honors project which demonstrates an unusually high level of academic achievement. The types of honors projects which will be eligible for consideration will be defined by the academic departments and/or disciplines subject to the approval of the Honors Committee.

The Honors Committee will have final authority to select those students who will graduate with honors. The Committee will be composed of the Dean serving as chairman and one representative from each academic division, to be appointed by the appropriate division chairman.

Proposals for honors projects should be submitted by students by April 15 in their junior year, but not later than September 15 in their senior year. (The spring date was chosen so that a student could begin an honors project in the summer, if appropriate.)

Each student submitting a proposal must have a faculty member who is willing to supervise the project. The proposal must be recommended by the faculty member and the department chairman. If the proposal is accepted by the Committee, then it must have the recommendation of the supervising faculty member and the department chairman when submitted in final form. The completed honors project must be received by the Honors Committee by March 30 of the student's senior year.

Each student completing an honors project will make an oral presentation open to the public on his/her project.

No student need necessarily be awarded honors and normally no more than 5% of the graduating class should qualify for honors.

Students interested in applying for graduation with honors may check with Mrs. Barbara Short in the Office of the Registrar to determine if they are in the top quarter of their class. Then they are encouraged to discuss their interest with the chairman of the department or division in which they are majoring and receive advice on the development of a proposal. Proposals should be submitted through the Office of the Dean.

Information on privacy given

Federal legislation (Buckley Amendment) concerning the privacy of information, states that students may elect to have their names, addresses and other "directory" information not listed in such a publication. Colleges may publish directory information concerning an individual student if the student does not request his/her information be withheld.

In compliance with this legislation, Clinch Valley College requests that any student (full or part-time) who does not want to have certain information listed in the directory notify the Registrar's Office by September 25, 1985.
