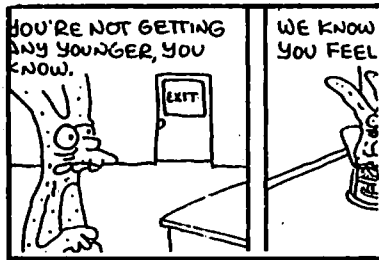


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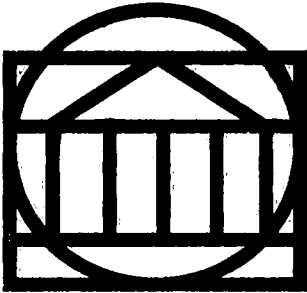

Kevin Short elected new SGA president

"It feels really great," said Kevin Short about his April 25th election to the office of Student Government Association president. "I know this election was really close. I feel like I really need to prove to students right now...that I'm going to do my best to accomplish what I set out to do," commented Short.

Short said he found out about his victory when a friend pulled him out of a night class to tell him the results. "I was really surprised. I really didn't think I would win," Short said.

"It was the upperclassmen who pulled me through," the newly elected president noted. According to Short, he won approximately 70 to 75 percent of the upperclassmen votes.

As for his challenges as leader of the SGA, Short said, "Right now I think my biggest

problem next year is going to be housing for the Greeks." Short pointed out that, as of the fall semester, there would be no Greek housing.

Short also commented he wants to keep commuters informed about activities by placing a bulletin board in the Zehmer Building. He also plans to work on changing some of the rules and policies in McCraray Dormitory.

Speaking of one long-term goal, Short said he would like to achieve more of a student say in activity fee allocations by "getting with the people who allocate the money." He hopes to "have the students fill out an allocation form," which would allow students to choose where their money goes.

Short described himself as being along the lines of a conservative and his new vice-president, Tom O'Toole, as more of a radical. However, he believes he and O'Toole will

work well together, giving and taking.

Said Short, "His ideas [in his presidential platform last year] hit home on some of the ideas I would like to accomplish."

Short remarked that when he heard the votes were going to be recounted, "I was kind of worried about that."

"There's no self interest in it to begin with and there's no self interest now that I'm president."

"I think we're going to have a good year next year," said Short.

Ukrainian Dancers not "Russian"

I first wish to commend Nona Shepherd on her thorough coverage of the International Arts Festival as a whole and on her story in the 4/23/90 Cavalier. However, a serious factual error was made in her references to the Ukrainian Dance Ensemble and Ukrainian Pavilion which needs clarification.

they have their own language, which is entirely different from Russian; they have their own literature, art, music, culture. A particularly well known feature of Ukrainian art is the Ukrainian Easter egg, so unique that it has become a virtually universal symbol of this religious holiday.

Specifically, erroneous mentions were made to Ukraine as a "Russian region", its native dances as "Russian dance" and its traditional Easter eggs as "Russian" as well. It is essential that at an institution of higher learning such confusions be avoided as they insult people's origins and their national and cultural prides. Additionally, such oversights betray a lack of geographical and political awareness about a region which is in the news on a daily basis today.

Politically speaking, it should be noted also that Ukraine has its own representative to the United Nations, though admittedly he has not been free to exercise his vote unfettered.

Russia is not Ukraine and Ukraine is not Russia. Both are merely two republics of the Soviet Union. The Russian State is only one of fifteen constituent republics of the "Union", which include Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Armenia, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Kazakhstan and of course Ukraine which is largest and most populous of these after the Russian republic. Ukrainians strongly resent being called Russians as

Finally, Ukrainians, like Lithuanians today, do not appreciate being lumped into the same Russified basket, particularly by western reporters with free access to information. It is already common knowledge what Lithuanians think of being called Russian. So since these issues are so prominent in our daily newsfare, it is imperative that we pay attention to them and understand them.

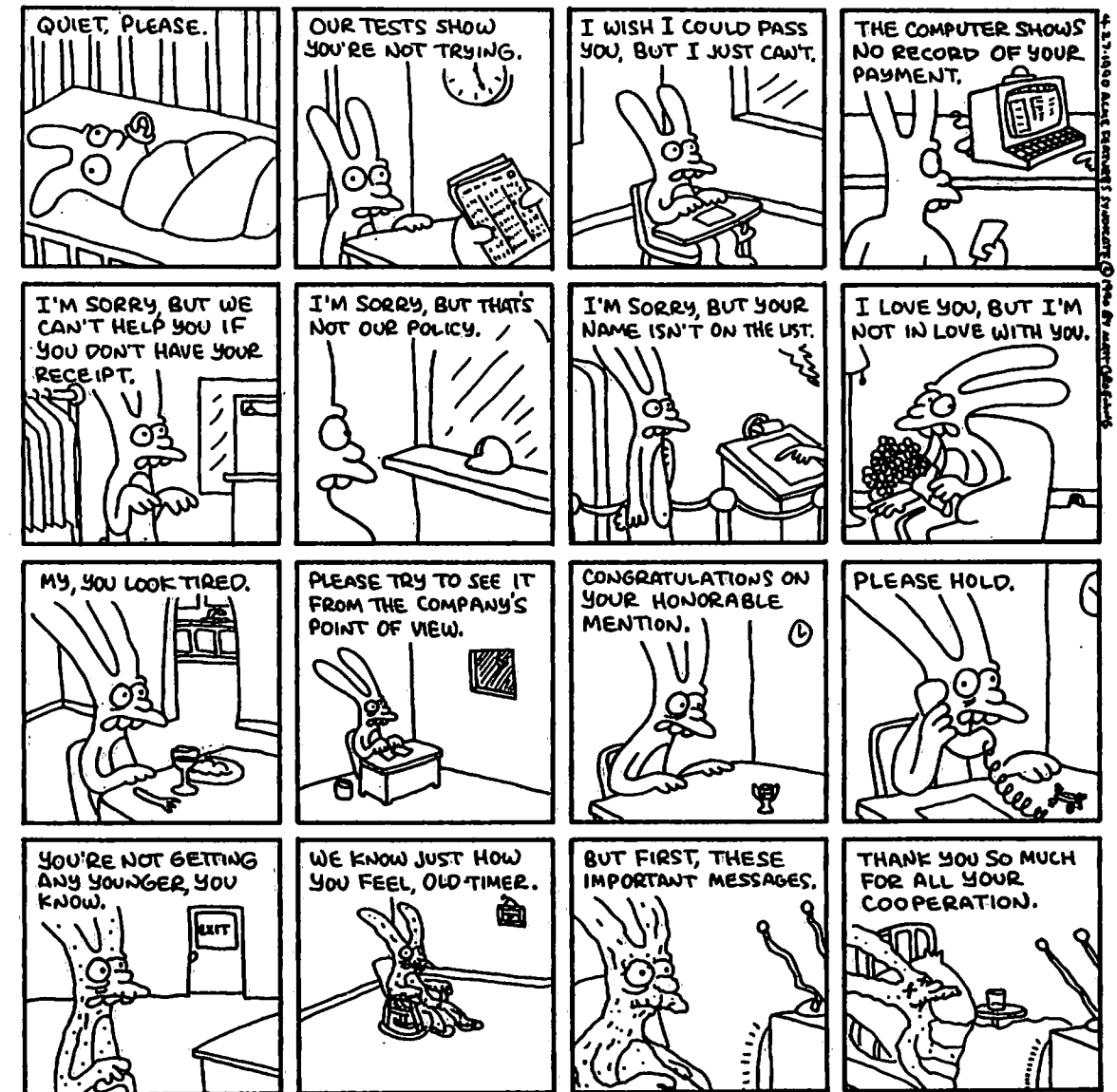

The John Cook Wyllie Library celebrated National Library Week on April 23 and 24, with information sessions about what services the library has to offer and will have to offer in the future.

According to Library Associate Director Dr. Dania Bilal, "As we move toward the year 2000, we will be witnessing a tremendous change in accessing information. Students and faculty will need to be prepared for this change."

In the near future, the library's catalog system will become automated, changing from the present card catalog system. Dr. Bilal remarked, "The on-line catalog will be accessed not only in the library, but also outside, such as from dormitories, offices and homes."

Dr. Bilal said that these changes will be due to the installation of the Local Area Network (LAN), currently being set up.

One service the library currently offers is computerized literature searching, which saves time and puts an end to the hard work of manual searching of materials such as indexes. Another advantage of computer searching is that databases are more up-to-date than printed indexes. CVC provides access to more than 250 Dialog databases.
