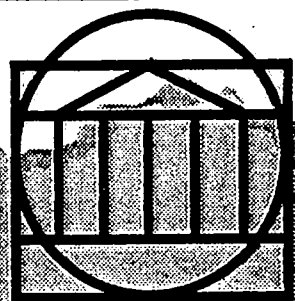

Holbrook pleads guilty, gets probation

Mandy Holbrook, a 19-year-old CVC student from Clintwood, pleaded guilty to amended charges involving the death of a baby found in her Honors Apartment last spring.

In the plea agreement, Holbrook received a five year suspended sentence for involuntary manslaughter and another five year suspended sentence on felony parental neglect charges.

Holbrook was placed on two years supervised probation and will reimburse the Wise County Sheriff's Office \$1,000 for investigation expenses, the agreement said.

On Monday, Holbrook was to begin trial on felony homicide and felony parental child neglect charges with a maximum 30 year prison sentence.

Authorities found a dead full-term baby boy wrapped in towels in a box under Holbrook's bed in her Honors Apartment on Feb. 25.

The state medical examiner said the baby was born alive on Feb. 24 and died of extreme post-natal neglect.

According to a statement from the Wise County Sheriff's Office and the Commonwealth Attorney's Office, the baby's umbilical cord had not been clamped which would have resulted in a large amount of blood loss.

Lemons replaces Knight as Chancellor

There are many new faces on campus this semester. One of the newest faces is the interim Chancellor, L. Jay Lemons. Dr. Lemons was appointed as acting Chancellor by UVA's President Casteen after former Chancellor Jim Knight accepted a position at UVA.

Dr. Lemons is originally from a town of 25,000 in the western part of Nebraska, a vast farming and ranching area. Both of his parents were teachers.

Dr. Lemons earned a B.A. in philosophy and a B.S. in Physical Education at Nebraska Wesleyan University in Lincoln, a school of approximately 1500 students. After completing his undergraduate studies, Lemons accepted a position; and, at this time, he began working on his Master's Degree. After

achieving a Master's Degree, Lemons landed a position at Texas A & M where his duties were mainly concerned with resident life; however, his duties also included student conduct and alcohol and drug addiction. After spending 3 years at Texas A & M, Lemons decided to start on a doctoral degree. He narrowed his college choices and decided on the University of Virginia.

Chancellor Lemons has four goals he would like to accomplish this year. "The first one is to get to know the people and the place as well as I can. For me that means trying to be able to match names and faces...." Goal number two is to do as much as possible to "maintain the positive momentum at Clinch Valley." This goal also involves main-

The Bookstore is owned and operated by Clinch Valley College and is located on the ground level of Cantrell Hall. Our Bookstore hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., Monday thru

Eubanks named Director of Housing & Minority Affairs

Mary Eubanks, Housing Director and Director of Minority Student Affairs, says she has a different way of doing things here at CVC.

Originally from Charlottesville, she received her undergraduate degree at Elon College and her Masters at Appalachian State University.

She has been in the housing field for eight years and feels she knows how things should run based on her experience.

"I am concerned about development. People need to prepare for life after graduating high school," Eubanks said.

She says that she has a program geared for all years. For example, Seniors need to be taught different things from Freshmen and so forth.

She says that college should be a new and good learning experience. "Students need to realize that they are women and men instead of boys and girls and take responsibility for their actions"

She is not at all intimidated by the conflicts surrounding last year's Housing Director, Chris Rizzo, such as the controversial housing policy.

"It is something we can work with. Everyone got a space that wanted space, and there is still space available."

As for the new position which was

created, Director of Minority Students Affairs, she has worked with this position before with African American and International students. She says that she needs support from students to continue with this program.

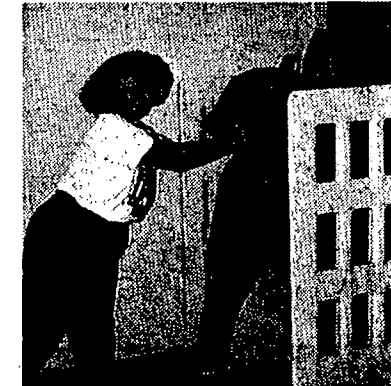
"A student's education needs to be not only what they learn in the classroom, but what they do in their lifestyle as well," Eubanks said.

Campus Shop installs new security system

The Campus Shop, CVC's bookstore, has installed a new security system to discourage shoplifting.

Named KNOGA, the system is located at the Campus Shop's exit.

KNOGA is activated by a magnetic target placed on merchandise, similar to the system used in Goody's department stores. After an item is purchased, the target is either deactivated or removed.

"I didn't want to do this, but we had a lot of shoplifting last year," Campus

Shop Manager Estella Willis said. Although the exact shrinkage figures are unknown, the numbers may be surprisingly large.

"I didn't want to do this, but we had a lot of shoplifting last year," Campus Shop Manager Estella Willis said.

Willis promises to "strictly enforce" the bookstore's shoplifting policy this year.

If a student is caught attempting to steal merchandise, campus police will be notified and the person will go to Honor Court. Depending on the value of the merchandise, Willis will decide whether the Wise Police are called.

KNOGA is not just for catching criminals, however, it will also protect innocent customers who may be falsely accused of stealing, Willis said.

The Campus Shop also plans to hire an hourly employee to help during their extended hours, Mon.-Fri. 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. and Saturdays from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Ramseyer says Cavs are stronger and faster this year

When asked to comment on his first year of Clinch Valley College Football Ramseyer said, "I am still amazed at how quickly we were able to put things together to get on the road in '91. I have

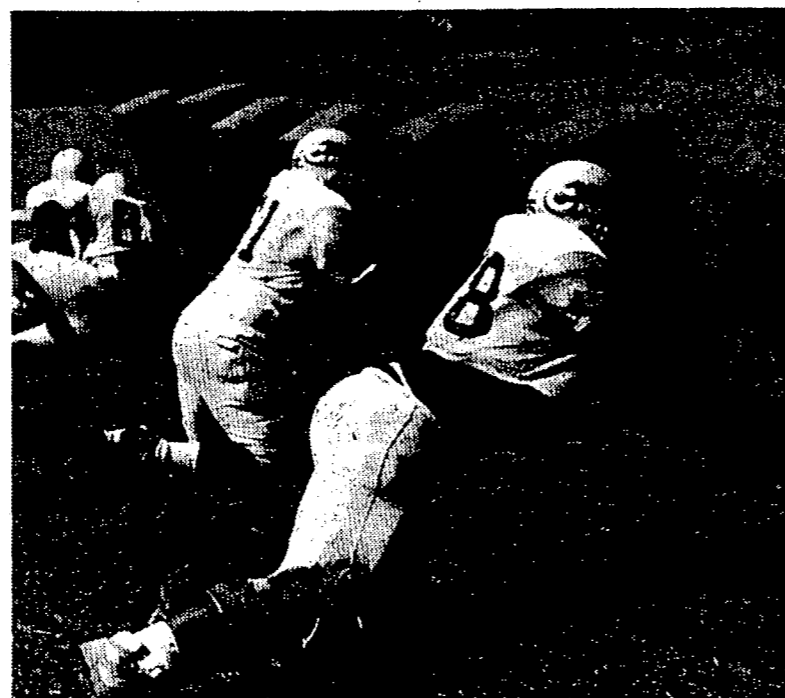
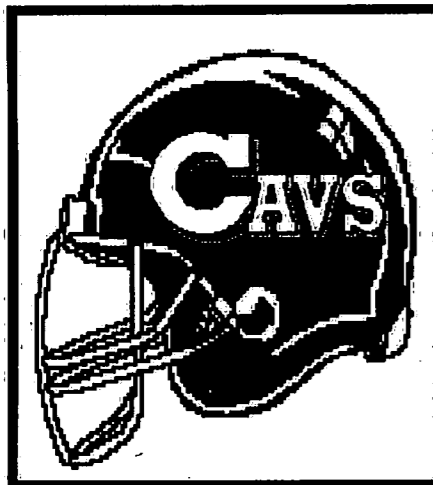
been extremely impressed with the initial and continued support from people throughout Southwest Virginia."

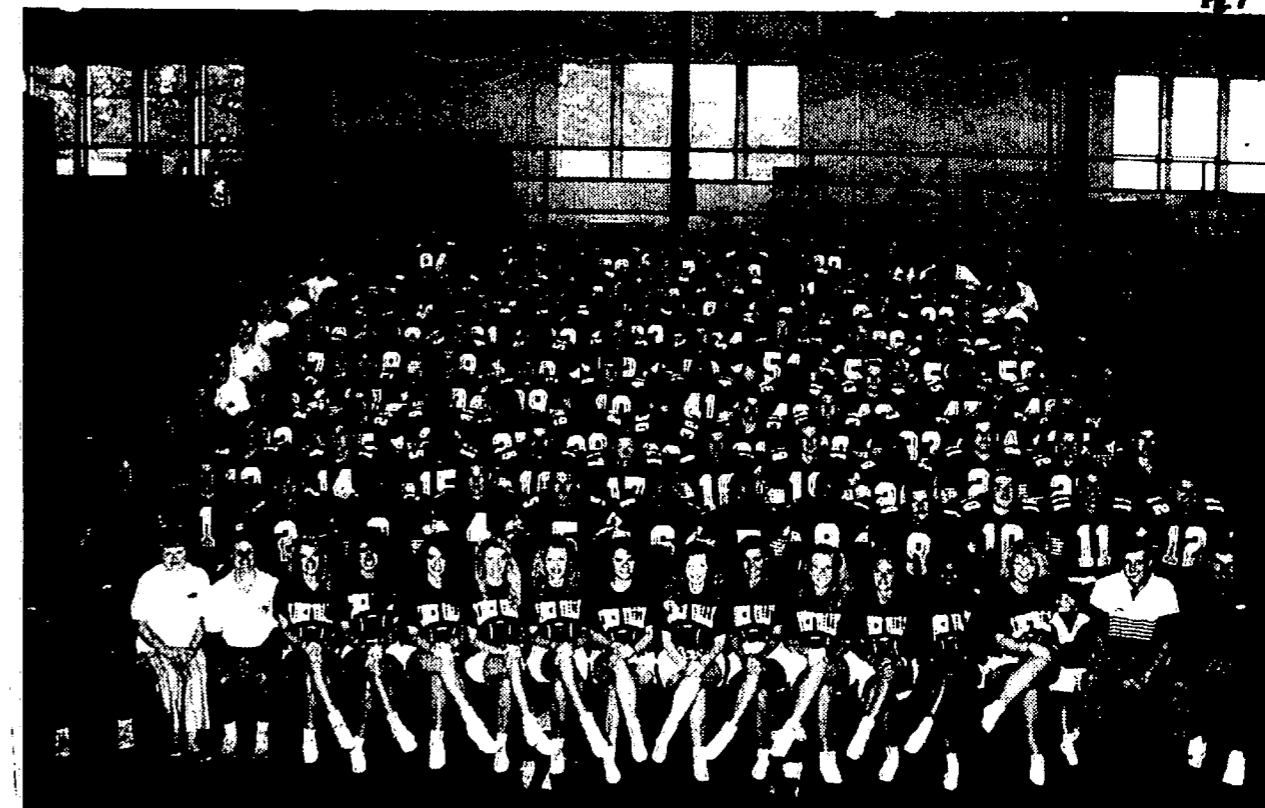

taining the recruiting strength and visibility of CVC. It requires working hard to make new funds for the college, as well. The third goal develops both academic and residential life at CVC. Chancellor Lemons says, "For me that means finding new, better and more ways to help create opportunities for students and faculty members to have interaction outside the classroom." The final goal is to work effectively with the local legislative delegation and helping the general assembly to know and understand the needs of the college.

Chancellor Lemons and his wife are expecting their first child. He says he is very family oriented, including his two canines. He enjoys camping and hiking and considers himself a "semi-retired runner" and an avid sports fan.

One of the most important questions about the future of the college is the General Obligation Bond Referendum which will be on the ballot in November's election. "Passage of that bill is really really important to the future of the college," states Lemons.

Lemons advises freshmen to get involved. "You are only going to get as much out of the Clinch Valley experience as you put into it."

Lemons feels that CVC's potential is unlimited. He comments, "There is a vast region that can be well served by Clinch Valley....I think we can improve our retention rate significantly. I only see the potential for this place becoming better and better."

Lemons would like to improve student life on campus in the future by moving all residential students on campus in permanent housing. He would also like to see students involved in more student organizations. Furthermore, Lemons would like to see the development of a student "Living Room," a lounge where all students, commuters and residents alike, can go to fellowship, mingle, study, or relax.

Dr. Lemons believes that his favorite role as Chancellor will be working with and helping people who care about the college.

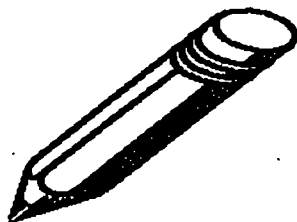
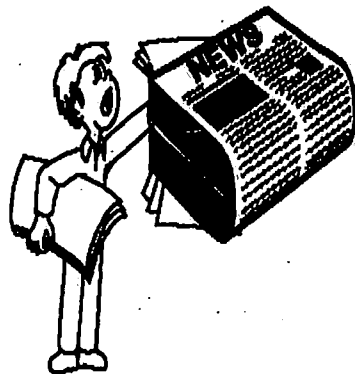
