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## CVC Students found not guilty on assault charges

The Student Disciplinary Board of Clinch Valley College has reported that two students have been found not guilty on two charges of alleged sexual misconduct in campus housing.

In the hearing held March 3, the students, whose names are being withheld under the Family Right to Privacy Act, were charged with violating the College's Standards of Conduct, specifically Standards #1, #2, and #8 outlined in *The Source*, according to a statement from the Student Disciplinary Board.

According to the statement, "The Board found the students not guilty of violating Standards of Conduct #1 (Physical and/or emotional abuse of any person on College owned or controlled property or at College sponsored or supervised functions, or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any such person) and #2 (Sexual misconduct, including sexual assault or sexual intercourse without consent)."

The students were found guilty of "Disorderly conduct on College owned, operated, or controlled property...including acts which violate the rights of others, which tend to breach the peace, or which are deemed lewd, indecent, or obscene," Standard of Conduct #8 from *The Source*.

The panel, comprised of both students and faculty, recommended to Dean of Students Carolyn Brooks that "the students receive a written reprimand and be placed on disciplinary probation through the Spring of 1994." This would include all extracurricular activities for the next academic year.

The college was first notified of an alleged sexual assault after the two victims went to the emergency room of a local hospital.

In an address to all students on Feb. 18, CVC's Chancellor L. Jay Lemons first announced that two students were allegedly sexually assaulted on campus in early evening hours on Feb. 17.

According to the statement Lemons read to students in the Chapel of All Faiths, the victims were acquaintances of their alleged attackers.

The two alleged assailants were suspended in connection with the charges and given 72 hours to appeal the suspension. The two male students "requested a probable cause hearing and the Student Disciplinary Board determined they should be allowed to return to school pending the hearing," Lemons said.

Campus Police conducted an investigation to determine if college regulations had been violated.

The victims chose not to press criminal charges.

Carter, the college's only mascot, is a sophomore from Salem, Virginia. His antics have garnered coverage not only by ESPN, but local, state, and regional media as well.

## 1993 Major League Baseball is loaded with talent

Major League Baseball in 1993 will be loaded with talent. Unfortunately for the American League, their senior partners, have all of it; especially the National League west.

The western division has an over abundance of baseball skill, particularly in the pitching department.

The Atlanta Braves are definitely the front runners here. Their pitching staff is incredible with former Cy Young Award winner Tom Glavine, Steve Bedrosian, Mark Davis, and last years winner Greg Maddox, not to mention 1992's strike-out leader John Smoltz and south-paw Steve Avery.

## Rusty Wallace and his Pontiac are back

The boys are definitely back in town and in serious contention for the Winston Cup Championship. After suffering a violent crash in the season opening Daytona 500 that sent his Pontiac Grand Prix flipping 16 times. The 1989 Winston Cup Champion Rusty Wallace has placed an impressive 1st and 2nd in the previous two races.

With the addition of Buddy Parrot as crew chief and "Suitcase" Jake Elder as chassis man, Wallace and the Miller Genuine Draft Racing Team have made a strong showing in the early stages of the Nascar season.

Wallace attributes his success to an extensive weight training and conditioning program by his pit crew members and improved research and development in his engine and aerodynamic departments.

After qualifying 10th at Rockingham's "lady in black," Wal-

lace nudged out Dale Earnhart to take the checkered flag, giving the 36 year old driver his 22nd career victory. The following week at Richmond International Raceway Wallace went on to finish 2nd just behind Davey Allison's Ford Thunderbird.

Wallace, in partnership with Don Miller and Roger Penske (car owner for Rick Mears and Emerson Fittipaldi of Indy racing fame) formed the Mooresville, N.C. based Penske Racing Team in 1991 from the ground up and has since captured numerous pole positions and been to victory lane four times.

Keep your eye on Wallace and his younger brother Kenny Wallace, who is in contention for Rookie of the Year honors this season. Wallace

is always a good bet for winning any short track race on the circuit.

Also keep an eye on the Rick Hendrick/Dupont sponsored Jeff Gordon in the number 24 Lumina Chevrolet.

This 21-year-old rookie is proving that he can hang with the big dogs on race day.

With 13 inter-squad games under their belt, the CVC squad is anxious to face a uniform other than their own.

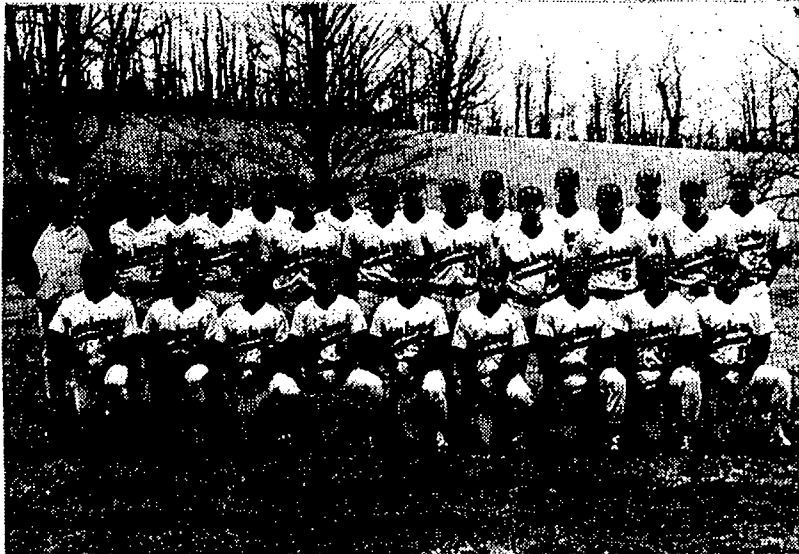
As Monday's practice came to a close, Spenilla was preparing his team for the rough schedule ahead.

CVC is scheduled to travel to Pippa Passes, KY to face the TVAC foe Alice Lloyd this Thursday. They will see their first home game until March 25 when they host Alice Lloyd.

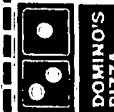

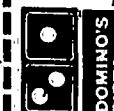
