The National Football League's season is halfway through and this year's action has proven violently brutal, but as exciting as ever. At the end of week seven, fifteen of the twenty-eight opening day starting quarterbacks had been injured or benched for replacements. Every division is up for grabs at the mid-point of the season, but the whole scene could change quickly if key players go out with or are unable to come back from iniuries.

In the American Conference East, the Miami Dolphins lead the division and have surged to a 6-1 record while outscoring their opponents 172-118. The big news has been the loss of Dan Marino for the season due to an Achilles tendon injury, and the performance of Scott Mitchell the last two games. Mitchell's first pass from scrimmage was returned for a touchdown by the Cleveland Brown's secondary, but since then he has been more than a capable backup.
