College TV station set to begin broadcasting next month

The college's TV station, still unnamed, plans to air its first programming within the next month.

The Office of Information Technology, the Department of Communication Studies and a group of the college's students have been working to develop a new, working educational television station here at the college, said Vice Chancellor for Information Technology Keith Fowlkes said in an e-mail.

"Right now we are in the planning process piecing together ideas and setting up the studio," said Alison Ray, coordinator of media services.

The station will broadcast educational programs as well as bring the latest news and events to the attention of the campus and surrounding counties.

Fowlkes said students from all different majors will have the opportunity to produce programs, like interviews with guest speakers and faculty members, and a reality show that documents what it is like to be a student at the college.

"One big resource that will set Channel 55 apart from other local school channels on Comcast is our new partnership with Annenburg Media to air educational television programming," Fowlkes said. "This programming ranges

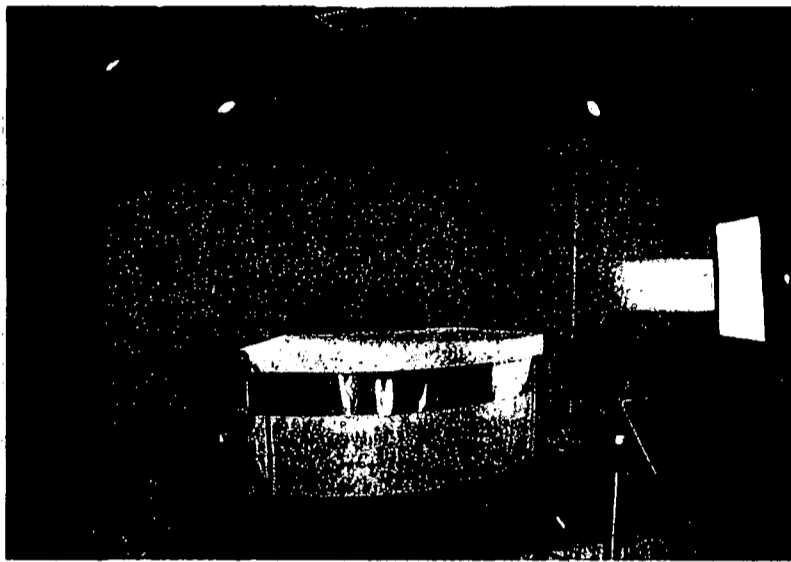

Campus installs new emergency alert system

In the wake of the April 2007 shooting at Virginia Tech, UVa-Wise has implemented a new campus-wide security system that notifies students and faculty in the event of an emergency.

The system was tested early in the spring semester.

"It sounds like an air raid siren," said senior James Kennedy.

The project, which cost around \$30,000 to implement, is only used in the case that there is a need for a lockdown on campus said Police Chief Steve McCoy.

The system is activated manually from the campus police station but can also be accessed through police radios. The siren system also doubles as a PA system that can reach the entirety of the campus.

The campus is furthering its security measures by adding more security cameras in all student parking areas and some dormitories as well as starting a Crisis Committee and internet notification system.

"We've work hard and diligently to put this system in," McCoy said.

The events at Virginia Tech sent a tremor throughout the college environment as many colleges took a much closer look at their own security measures.

Some college campuses have also instituted a program that sends text messages to students across campuses in the event of an emergency. The cost is only about one dollar per student.

The increased security measures should allow for safer and more secure campuses. But for some students it is more than an afterthought.

"After what happened at Tech, I think a lot more students are looking at how safe a campus is when choosing where to attend," said freshman Halla Kiser. "It makes colleges ask, 'Are we safe enough in the event that something like that happens here?'"

Students trespass on campus construction sites

"Our whole floor went into Crockett last semester when there were copperheads in the basement," said one student who wished to remain anonymous. "I know we weren't the only ones"

"I've been in Crockett a couple of times just to see what they were doing," said a senior who spoke on the condition of anonymity

However the campus administration has no tolerance for this type of self-education. As stated in the Student Handbook, "Unauthorized entry/exit or occupation of College facilities which are locked, closed to student activities, or otherwise restricted as to use" is "prohibited conduct for which a student is subject to discipline."

"The risk of personal injury to those trespassing after hours is real and substantial," said Travis Perry, the capital projects manager. "If anything were to ever happen as a result of an after-hour visit, beyond the personal injury to the individuals, the cost to both the college and the contractor would be significant and could impact not only that project but others as well."

Benke's work on campus has yielded him many awards during his nearly 30-year career at the college, including the Clinch Valley College Outstanding Service Award in 1998 and the UVa-Wise Harrison Award for Outstanding Service in 2004. He said that being recognized by his colleagues for his work is very important to him.

"[The awards] mean a lot when you are appreciated and honored," Benke said. "It means a lot when your peers give you these."

One of Benke's greatest concerns at the college is making the students comfortable in the library. Whether it's the comfy furniture, the coffee bar or implementing laptops, Benke said he wants students to find the library a welcoming atmosphere.

"I want this library to be very service-oriented and that students have a very comfortable environment," Benke said.

O.A.R. (Of a Revolution) has been known primarily as a college band for more than 10 years. Because of this, the group's live performances have constituted some of its best work. In 2007, the band released its third live conceit album, "Live From Madison Square Oarden."

Like their previous two live recordings, "Any Time Now" and "34th & 8th," tMs set is a double-disc showcasing some of the band's most memorable songs.

This is a paticularly good record because it is the first live album since their last studio-recorded effort and contains many of the best songs from "Stories of a Stranger."

The band begins its set with "Love and Memories," one of the band's few songs that received regularradioairplay.

The group continues to mix and match new songs like "Heard the Word" and "One Shot" with older favorites including "About Mr. Brown," "Black Rock" and "About an Hour Ago..

It's easy to hear that the band has im- (HD)ved over the years. Richard On's abilities on guitar have greatly improved and the original sound of Jerry DePizzo on saxophone continues to be one of the band's most interesting aspects.

While lead vocalist Marc Roberge's voice lends itself perfectly to the college sound of tliil band, it s* UMe ifriiisia<i-i^ \aii he regularly changes the way he sings certain verses. It makes it hard to fdlow along with songs that I've learned and I dare say it's difficult for the fans as well.

While the first disc of the album is entertaining, it's not until the second disc that the band really shows off.

"That Was a Crazy Game of Poker" has long been the band's most popular soig. It's

obvious lbal the group takes pride in its flagship tune that runs for more than 15 minutes.

The band starts off by playing a completely different opening to the song. In fact, the crowd does not even know what song they are playing until nearly fow minutes into the track when the familiar opening begins and the crowd really gets going. Roberge lets the crowd sing much of the chorus and the Madison Square Garden audience doesn't disappoint and really gives you the feeUng of being at the actual concert

I was a little surprised, however, at the lack of emotion shown l^ much of the crowd throughout the CD until "Crazy Game of Pck-er." It's hard to tell that Uiey are even there at certain points of the album. This could be because Roberge changes many of the lyrics-making it hard for the audience to follow or sunply because the producers didn't get good enough sound from them.

All in all, this is a good CD. If you're an O.A.R. fan who's looking for live versions of some of the band's newer songs, then this is the record for you. However, if you ate just looking for a good live album from the group, "Any Time Now" is a better choice.
