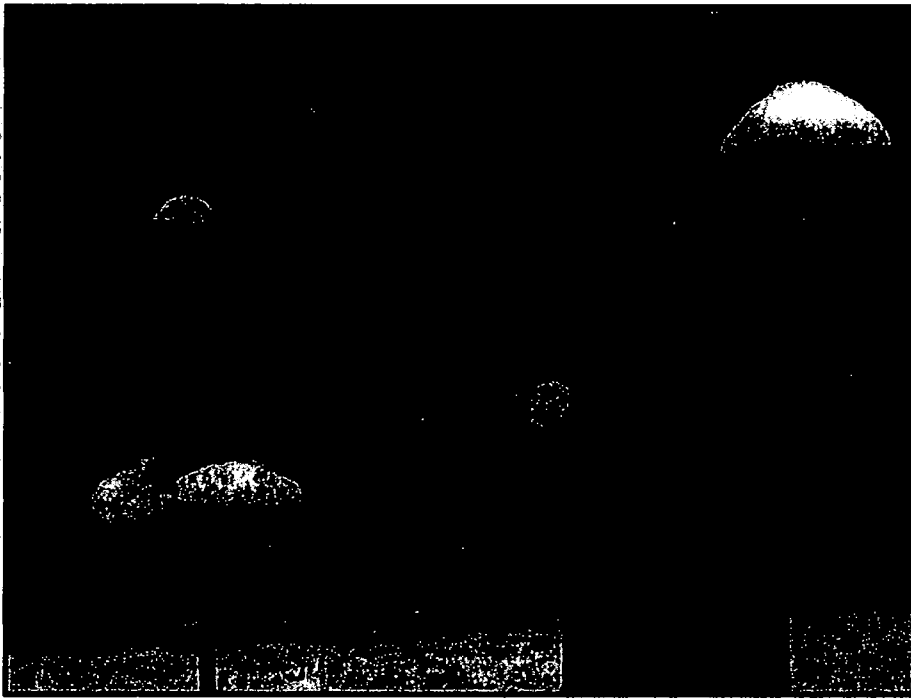

Kaine to speak at commencement

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Not since 1985, when the Honorable Charles S. Robb came to visit, has a current governor of Virginia addressed the crowd and graduates at the commencement ceremonies.

This year, Gov. Tim Kaine, who is in his fourth year in office, will give the keynote address at the 2009 Commencement on May 16.

His attendance is the direct result of Chancellor David Prior's persistence.

"I actually met him my first year. I was here... and asked him to consider, in his third or fourth year of his term, to come to UVa-Wise," Prior said. "I've seen him on numerous occasions since then and each time I reminded him. I think it was last summer when he said he would do it."

Kaine's wife, Anne Holden, is the daughter of former governor Linwood Holden, originally from Big Stone Gap.

"He knows the area and has included us in his budgets, so he's a real friend of the college and Southwest Virginia," Prior said.

The governor has visited before, once as part of a mine safety conference and once to give a press conference from the Lila Vickers Smith House and sign a bill dealing with drugs, Prior said.

The governor's arrival will mark the third visit from a big-name state politician this semester. Sen. Jim Webb visited campus in February and held a town hall-style meeting here and Sen. Mark Warner will visit Monday in conjunction with the college's

celebration of Founder's Day.

"Two U.S. Senators are pretty big guns, but there's only one Governor of the state," Prior said. "We're getting a lot of attention here; it feels like we're 'on' a lot. But I would rather this attention than being overlooked."

Kaine has been in office since January 2006. According to his Web site, in 2008, he led efforts to secure a \$1.6 billion bond package to expand college access for Virginians. This money has helped UVa-Wise by providing funds to build the planned \$30 million Convocation Center, and also allocating \$600,000 for accessibility projects.

Prior said that he is hopeful for this year's graduating class.

"Seriously hopeful," he said. "That means, I expect [graduating seniors] to do well, and I hope it works out that that happens sooner than later. All of you have matured as individuals, have worked hard, have learned how to achieve your goals, and I have very high expectations."

SGA hosts Spring Formal tonight

Mauri Wimbush, at right, said he won most of the matches he played Thursday.

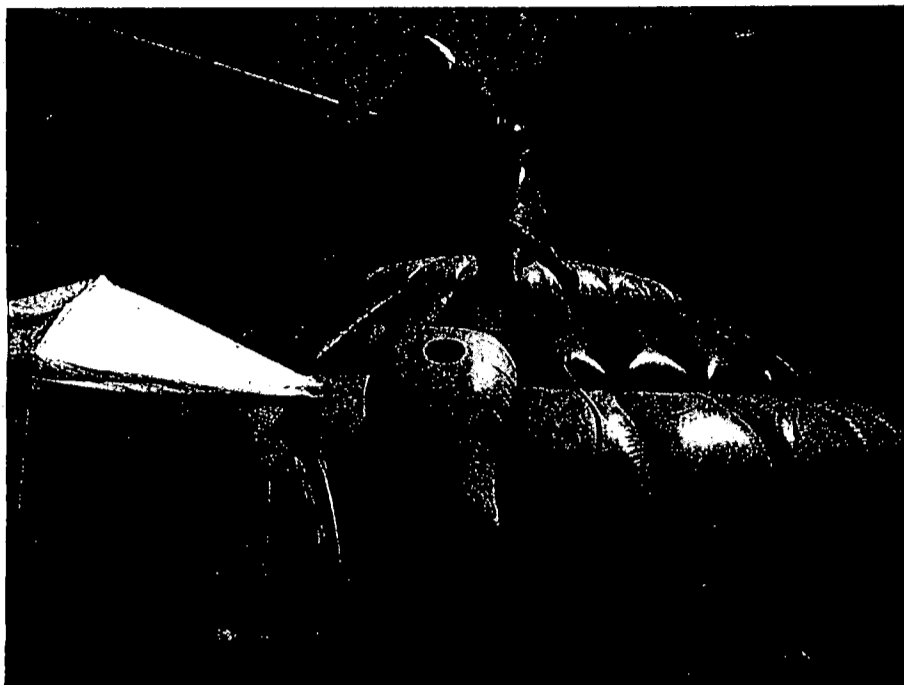

Return of Diesel and Walker make "Fast and Furious" a must see movie

I admit that I have been a fan of Vin Diesel and Paul Walker's fast action, car speeding movies since "The Fast and the Furious" in 2001.

I was a bit leery of "The Fast and the Furious: Tokyo Drift" in 2006, but I traveled to the theaters once more to see the action. I was disappointed, though, that the original cast wasn't used for Tokyo Drift. When I heard that Diesel and Walker were back for the entire production of "Fast and Furious," I was ecstatic.

Fast cars, jam-packed action and handsome men didn't disappoint me.

The story is focused on Dominic Toretto's (Diesel) search for the man who killed his girlfriend Letty (Michelle Rodriguez). Interestingly enough, Toretto meets up with Brian O'Connell (Walker) who is once more working undercover for the FBI, hoping to catch the biggest drug lord who is working between the U.S. and Mexican borders.

At times, the plot was a bit unsatisfying.

O'Connell reunites with Toretto's sister, Mia (Jordana Brewster) in what seems to be an all-too-common situation. Toretto also has some potential romantic moments with Gal Gadot (Gisele Harabo). These scenes feel forced and as a sketchy solution for Letty's death.

Also, the drug smuggling situation is never really fully explained amongst all of the engine tune-ups and tire changes.

At random intervals the movie switches between board room meetings with O'Connell and several FBI agents to high speed car races. But the the cuts are so quick between the scenes you barely have time to adjust your mind before you're thrown directly back into an intense car race.

However, the racing makes up for all of the confusion. Beautiful revving engines create a symphony of American muscle and foreign cars, fighting against one another for the win.

The races are nothing less than intense, and, at times, violent. Forceful wrecks are shown where cars are smashed to unrecognizable scraps of metal, leaving no doubt that the driver has to be dead. The races are held on roads that are not closed off to the public, showing just how dangerous street racing can be.

All of the illegal action doesn't disappoint, either. Between stealing gas and smuggling drugs, you see the craziest driving of your life, with smooth gear shifting and NOS buttons in every vehicle.

Overall, it was a good movie. Action is around every turn, and the drug smuggling plot is interesting, if at times confusing and unsatisfying.

If you're short on cash, wait and just rent it. If not, and you like ridiculously fast and dangerous cars and happen to have a fetish for illegal actions of all sorts, go to the theater.

It won't disappoint.

This lack of practice could be causing some problems offensively for the team, which is unable to practice hitting.

"Weather has made life difficult," head coach Tori Raby-Gentry wrote in an e-mail. "It's hard to get into any kind of rhythm when you play a few days [one] week and [are] off about another week."

Raby-Gentry said Pikeville has always been a challenge for the team.

However, Raby-Gentry is confident about the players' abilities.

"I expect us to continue solid defense and for our hitters to build off of our most recent success," she said.

That success has been something that the Lady Cavs consistently earn because of defense, which, along with pitching, has been the team's greatest asset, Raby-Gentry said.

"Our defense has been steady and our pitchers have done a great job," she said. "Our offense has been what had struggled this year. The potential is there; it's just a matter of making adjustments and making better pitch selections."

Sophomore Megan McCoy said the team's bats are starting to come around.

As for the rest of the season, Raby-Gentry said she is looking forward to the conference tournament. She said, however, that the team's focus hasn't shifted beyond regular season games.

"I expect our team to build off the last two weeks of the season and hope that we have found more solid offense and are still solid defensively," she said.

McCoy is also looking forward to the upcoming playoffs.

"Of course I expect us to do well in

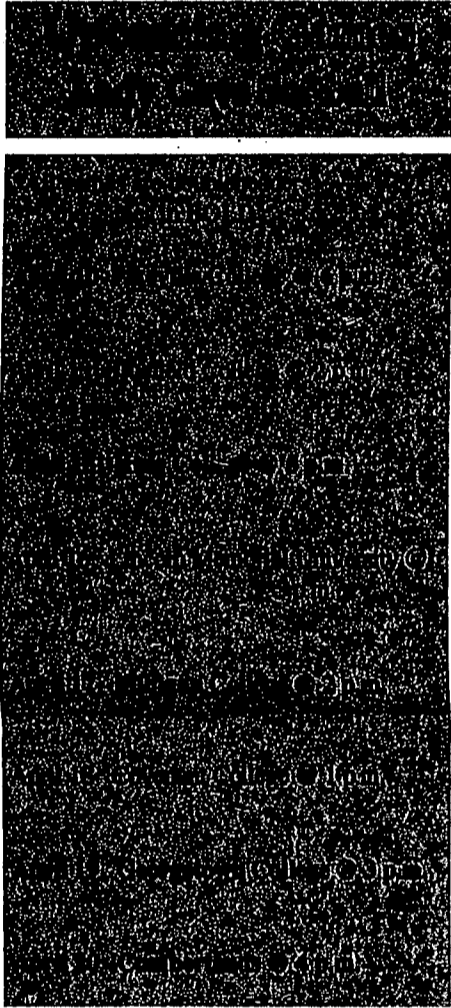

Roa named AAC baseball Player of the Week

Sophomore Luis Roa, who plays as a utility for the Cavs, was named the AAC baseball Player of the Week on Tuesday.

In the last seven games, Roa had 12 hits in 24 at bats, scored 15 runs, two doubles, three home runs and 10 RBIs.

He leads the Cavs with 36 runs, 13 walks, nine stolen bases and a .539 on base percentage.

On March 30, during a game against Virginia Intermont, Roa scored seven times while going four of six. During the April 1 game against Emory & Henry, he made a two-run homer.

Roa has consistently been a leader at the plate, ranking second in home runs (5), RBIs (24) and batting average (.412 on 28 of 68).

Golf team set to compete in Union Invitational

The Cavs golf team will compete in the Union Invitational against AAC rivals like Union College, Montreat College and Bluefield College on Monday, April 13.

The Cavs have not placed better than 7th this season. The team's best finish came on Oct. 6 at the King College Invitational when it placed 7th of 10.
